THE POTATO EMBARGO

Washington, Jan. 1.—Regulations of the most exacting character, regulating the importation of foreign potatoes into the United States, to guard against potato diseases, were laid down by Secretary Houston, of the department of agriculture today, in the form of official decision.

Forms requiring importers to notify the department of all shipments from countries not at present under the absolute quarantine ban, and the enforcement of a rigid inspection upon entry by the department's agents, are contained in the order.

The regulations also provide for lifting, under certain conditions, the quarantine now enforced against most of the potato-growing sections of the world. Upon the presentation of satisfactory evidence to the secretary of agriculture that a country is free from injurious potato diseases and insect pests, potatoes will be admitted from that country in accordance with the regulations governing the importations from countries not now quarantined against.

What is Coming During the Year

WORST OF WINTER WILL BE OVER BY MIDDLE OF JANUARY

The worst part of the winter will be over by the middle of January, 1914.

About the following dates will occur the principal cool, cold or very cold spells of weather due after the middle of January, and this list of cool and cold spells should result in almost a normal average of temperature and rainfall. There should be abnormally warm and dry weather from Jan. 15 to April 15, but, fortunately, the planetary and lunar conjunctions occurring every few days throughout the season will be adequate to counteract the warm and dry effects and cause normal weather as the rule until April 1. Among the cool or cold spells due, except when counteracted, will be
