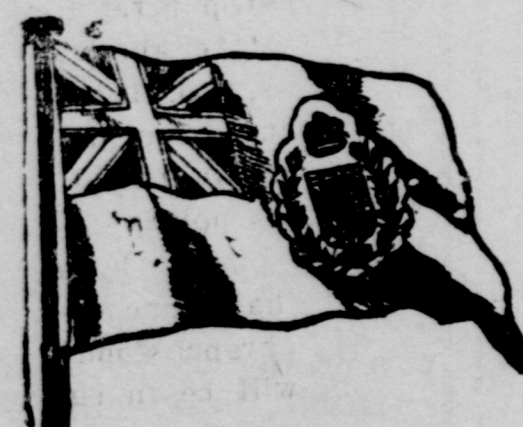

A PASTORAL LETTER.

The pastoral letter issued yesterday by the Roman Catholic Archbishops and Bishops of the ecclesiastical provinces of Quebec, Montreal and Ottawa, contains a most important contribution to the thought of the country at the present time. It is entitled "The Duties of Catholics in the present war."

The key-note of this admonition is co-operation. We quote the following noble words, expressing a sentiment which compels the acquiescence of all:

"England is engaged in this war, and who does not see that the destiny of every part of the Empire is bound up with the fate of her armies? She counts very rightly on our co-operation and this co-operation we are happy to say, is being generously offered to her both in men and in money. Already with the reservists of the allied nations naturalized or living amongst us, several thousand of our own compatriots have volunteered to go to the war, and others perhaps will follow."

Further the duty of co-operation is shown to include the care of the unfortunate victims of war and the stress of war at home. A call is made for contributions the sum total of which will be divided in half, one part to go to the National Patriotic Fund and the other to be administered for the welfare of the general poor and unfortunate.

The sentiment of this appeal is such as to put the Catholic Church in Canada on record as supporting the national cause at arms, wholeheartedly and without reserve. Thus it contains significant and important evidence of the freedom of British industries. It is a dignified and self-respecting appeal, in which the horrors of the war are deplored while the duties of the crisis are called to the attention of a very large and worthy section of the people in such a manner as will contribute in no small measure to the unanimity of action with which alone Canada can perform her national and imperial duties at this time.

In harmony with the prominent part taken by Pope Benedict in furthering the interests of peace, this pastoral letter brings home to the adherents of the church the desirability of ending the terrible European struggle as soon as peace can be procured. No part of the admonition is more impressive than this.—Montreal Mail.

As a virtual treason to Imperial and Canada interests, the idea of a general election must have originated in Germany. We have 35,000 Canadians ready to lay down their lives for the Empire. While they are fighting our battles, some domestic traitor proposes to withdraw support and sympathy by bringing on an election, that will not only interfere with the sending of further support, but disfranchise 35,000 Canadians now engaged in much sterner and much more needed work than that of a premature election.

SIXTY-NINTH ANNUAL MARITIME BAPTIST CONVENTION

Held in Fredericton—250 Delegates Present—Officers for Ensuing Year

The sixty-ninth annual maritime Baptist convention opened in Brunswick street Baptist church, Fredericton, Saturday morning with an attendance of about 250 delegates. The first half hour was given over to devotional exercises led by Rev. Dr. Francis of Boston. Mayor Mitchell officially welcomed the delegates to the city and addresses of welcome were also delivered by pastors of the local Baptist churches. Rev. Dr. Hutchinson replied.

Rev. Dr. Francis, Rev. Dr. Brown, of Toronto; Mr. Poultrous of Montreal; Mayor Mitchell and the pastors of the local churches were invited to seats in the convention.

Reports (were submitted on the financial condition of the eastern section, foreign missions and denominational funds of the three provinces. The following were appointed a nominating committee:—Rev. Clark, Rev. W. F. Parker, Rev. Z. L. Fash, D. C. Clarke, Rev. L. H. Crandall and Rev. L. E. Acland.
