MAYOR JONES TELLS OF SUCCESSFUL YEAR

Outlook For Coming Year is Good

Looks Forward to Increased Prosperity—Believes I. C. R. Operation of Valley Railroad Will Be of Great Benefit

(Special to The Telegraph.) Woodstock, N. B., Jan. 1.—At the request of The Telegraph correspondent, Mayor W. P. Jones today made the following statement: "Woodstock never has had a boom, but has experienced the same conditions of prosperity and progressiveness which has always been her good fortune, and the year just closed has been no exception."

"The year has been a successful one. The town has made steady progress. A number of buildings have been constructed. There are no vacant houses."

"The Fisher Memorial school, which cost more than \$60,000, was completed by the trustees of the estate of the late Lewis P. Fisher and handed over to the school trustees of the town as a free public school. The building is now being occupied and is considered to be the finest public school building in the province. Through the late Mr. Fisher's generosity, a free public library and a vocational school are being built. These, with the other public buildings now in the town, place Woodstock on a par with any town in the maritime provinces in respect to public buildings."

"The policy of laying permanent streets has been continued during the year and some excellent work done."

"The town enjoys the best of fire protection, with an efficient department, and during the past year has had no serious fire."

"Business has been good, but I look forward to a period of very greatly increased prosperity for the town during the next few years. Many more manufacturing industries can be successfully carried on here when the St. John Valley railway is operated by the Intercolonial. We have been at much disadvantage in the past with respect to manufacturing by the fact that only one railway entered the town, and the freight rates are those usually imposed at a non-competitive point."

"Now that a greater interest is being taken in the cultivation of the land owing to the high prices of farm products, Woodstock will share in the increased prosperity which must come to Carleton county by reason of the fertility of its soil."

"I believe that the citizens of the town have reason to feel optimistic as to its future."
