The Vancouver World says:—After 23 years of faithful service on the Vancouver police force, Malcolm E. MacLennan was yesterday appointed chief of police by the board of police commissioners, the appointment to date from Jan. 1. Born at Montague, P. E. I., 39 years ago, the new chief came to British Columbia when but a young man and has made steady, persistent advancement since joining the force. He joined the force on May 1, 1901. On Sept. 7, 1903, he was married to Miss Kate Burpee, a Woodstock girl. He has an enviable record as a police constable.

The temperature has taken several drops downward during the past two weeks but not to the extent it did Sunday night. The lowest figure reached was 27 below zero, but it modified towards morning and at 9 o'clock registered 11 degrees below. It is expected, and hoped, that more moderate conditions will now prevail.
