## THE TRUTH ABOUT THE DREADNOUGHTS

Could Not Be Made Ready for Sea Before 1915—Borden Prevented the Addition of Four Fast Cruisers and Six Destroyers to the Empire

(Toronto Globe.) If The News knows anything at all about naval construction it must know that not a single battleship was laid down since Sir Robert Borden's still suggests that had Sir Robert Borden's emergency gift of Dreadnoughts been promptly sanctioned by Parliament, three battleships built with Canada's \$35,000,000 would now be in the battle line in the North Sea. Its most recent statement is in these words: "In demanding a blockade of neutral European ports serving as sources of supply for Germany, The Globe appeals afresh to British strength in the North Sea, to which it would contribute nothing while there was yet time."

completed till the spring of 1915. The Valiant, laid down at Fairfield, another Clyde yard, on February 24, 1913, is also set down for completion in the spring of 1915.

Had the Commons passed Premier Borden's emergency grant on the day it was presented, December 5, 1912, and had the Senate of Canada at once endorsed the proposal, no Canadian Dreadnought could have been contracted for and laid down in any British yard before May or June, 1913. Such a ship could not be completed ready for sea before the autumn of 1915. The News seems to think Dreadnoughts can be bought ready-made over the bargain counter. The fact is that on December 5, 1912, when Premier Borden made his proposal it was "too late" to add Dreadnoughts to Britain's strength for this war. By their unholty alliance with the Nationalists and their sneers at Laurier's "tin-pot" navy the Conservative party had prevented the addition of four fast cruisers and six destroyers to the Empire's armed strength. These ships, ordered in 1911, would have been ready for use in the present war: the Dreadnoughts proposed in the emergency measure of December, 1912, could not even have all records for rapid construction been broken. That is the truth about the Dreadnoughts. Will The News have the hardihood to deny it? And if it dare not do so what did it mean when it told its readers that The Globe refused to contribute to British strength in the North Sea "while there was yet time?"

The expression is dignified, too, and the Canadian minister didn't fall into the vernacular as is his custom, such as "Me and Kitch hit it off all right," or use some other similar and forceful expression.

"Kitchener and I are in accord," is the dignified, eloquent, modest way that our minister puts it.

The British world wonders in what serious state of collapse the empire would be if Col. Hughes had returned with the announcement that "Kitchener and I are not in accord."

## WHAT HAS HAPPENED

A Concise Outline of the Trend of Events That Have Transpired in the War Zone

Able bodied Belgians in England are being called home for the war. Up to the last week in October the British army is reported to have lost one-sixth of its officers.

One despatch says the British alone have buried over 25,000 Germans in Belgium in the last week.

A captured German officer says the Germans have lost 150,000 men since the capture of Ostend.

In that part of Belgium which has been flooded by the opening of the dikes, only the railroads and best highways are above water.

Lord Fitzmaurice, a son of Lord Lansdowne, a former Governor-General of Canada, has been killed in action.

A contingent of native troops from India has joined the Anglo-Japanese forces operating against the German fort in China.

More than 35,000 Germans and Austrians have been taken prisoners by the Russians in the fighting of ten days.

A correspondent of the London Daily Mail estimates the German losses along the line of the Yser Canal, in three or four days' fighting at 16,000 killed and 30,000 wounded.

The cavalry of the allies is performing marvels of endurance. One regiment took part in ten encounters in a single day, at the same time covering more than forty miles of ground.

A Petrograd despatch to Reuter's Telegram Company says the number of Austrian prisoners brought into Kiev since the commencement of the war has reached a total of 100,000.

Prince Louis of Battenberg, although First Lord of the Admiralty, is a German prince and the London Globe demanded his removal from office in deference to British public opinion.

Nine hundred Germans are reported to have deserted in Antwerp but this report should be taken with reserve. It is not an easy thing for a German soldier to get away from service. Where would he go?

During September only 125,778 bales of cotton were exported from the United States against 930,328 bales for the same month last year.

That is what war has done for the American cotton grower.

The number of casualties among the German troops recorded by the first fifty lists totals 231,218, divided as follows: Killed, 36,531; wounded, 159,165; missing, 35,522. The dead include 2,385 officers.

In Paris difficulty is being experienced in finding men enough to handle even the domestic coal supply.

The fuel must be ordered days in advance and even their delivery is considered a great favor.

Louis Wessels, head of one of the largest commission firms in Jamaica,

has been ordered to leave the Island in six days. He is partner in the firm of Wessels, Ku'enhof & Company, New York, and is charged with sending supplies to the Karsruhe.

A message from Sydney says the Australian Government proposes to guarantee a fixed minimum price of four shillings per bushel for all wheat.

off all newly-cultivated areas, and also to guarantee twenty per cent. if a bank advances for clearance of new land.

German aeroplanes dropped two bombs at Bethune, France. The first failed to explode, but the second, which fell among market women, killed nineteen of them and injured forty others. Two bombs were also dropped at Dunkirk on the same day. A woman and child were killed and all the windows in the neighborhood were smashed.

At one point along the Yser River, where the fiercest fighting of last week took place, the dead filled the channel of the waterway and formed a bridge over which the German survivors crossed the stream. Both banks of the river were covered with wounded, whom it was impossible to rescue for hours owing to the fierce artillery fire.

As soon as the British Parliament meets Premier Asquith will ask for another appropriation of \$500,000,000. It is said that one of the German 42-centimetre cannon on their right wing in France exploded, as the result of an excessive powder charge, and that the gunners and two hundred and fifty men were blown to pieces.

"If the war has brought any lesson home to Americans," says The Springfield Republican, "it is the peril which lurks in an atmosphere of jealous suspicion." And The Republican is right. Jealousy and suspicion played upon by selfish interests which gain by war and armaments, are the real root causes of the present calamity.

Prince Maurice of Battenberg, a

cousin of King George, and the young son of the late Prince Henry of Battenberg, and a brother of the Queen of Spain, who married Princess Beatrice, a sister of the late King Edward, died of wounds received on the battlefield in France. He was an officer of the King's Royal Rifle Corps.

In the dim glare of the burning bushes during a night attack on the British lines in Belgium some of the enemy threw down their arms and pleaded for mercy. No quarter, however, was given on either side. The work was too desperate for that. Bayonet and bullets did their work.

London, as a means of protection against possible Zeppelin raids, is kept in a state of almost complete darkness at night. At the same time motor traffic seems to be under less restraint than ordinarily and as a consequence, the Westminster Gazette, says, the loss of life by street accidents is as great as could be caused by a successful Zeppelin raid.


