Mr. and Mrs. Carleton B. Wetmore are receiving the congratulations of their friends over the arrival of a daughter, on Thursday, June 4th.

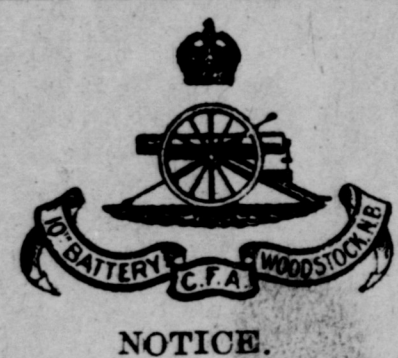
Mr. J. H. Thompson is in the hospital where he underwent an operation, Thursday, for internal trouble. He is expected to make a speedy recovery.
