Tenth Field Battery Left on Friday Amid  
Tremendous Enthusiasm—List of Brave Local

The last contingent of citizen soldiers left here on Friday. The swinging strain of the British Grenadiers touched the military spring of the Woodstock Field Battery and the men carried their stride with even and measured tread as they marched to the train at the C. P. R. station.

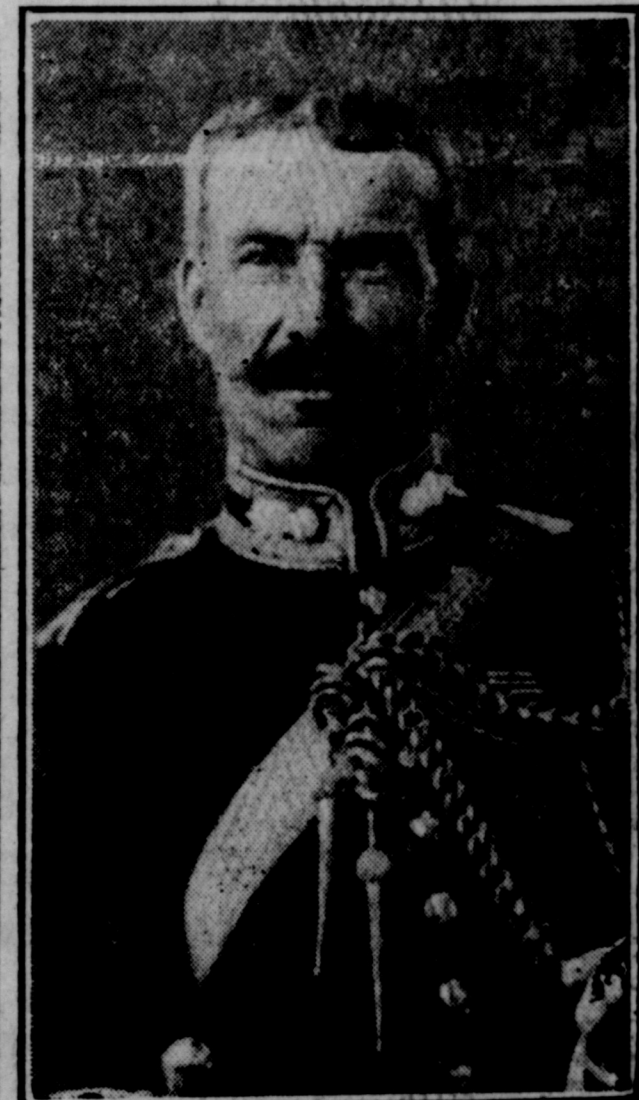
