The Independent Order of Odd Fellows of the Maritime provinces and Newfoundland were in annual session here this week, from Tuesday until Friday. The gathering is said to have been one of the most successful from a business, artistic and spectacular standpoint in the history of the order. In recognition of the distinction given the town in holding the encampment here, the citizens had the town square and Main street for the occasion. The decorations throughout were beautiful and impressive, the whole showing the result of much labor and public spirit. 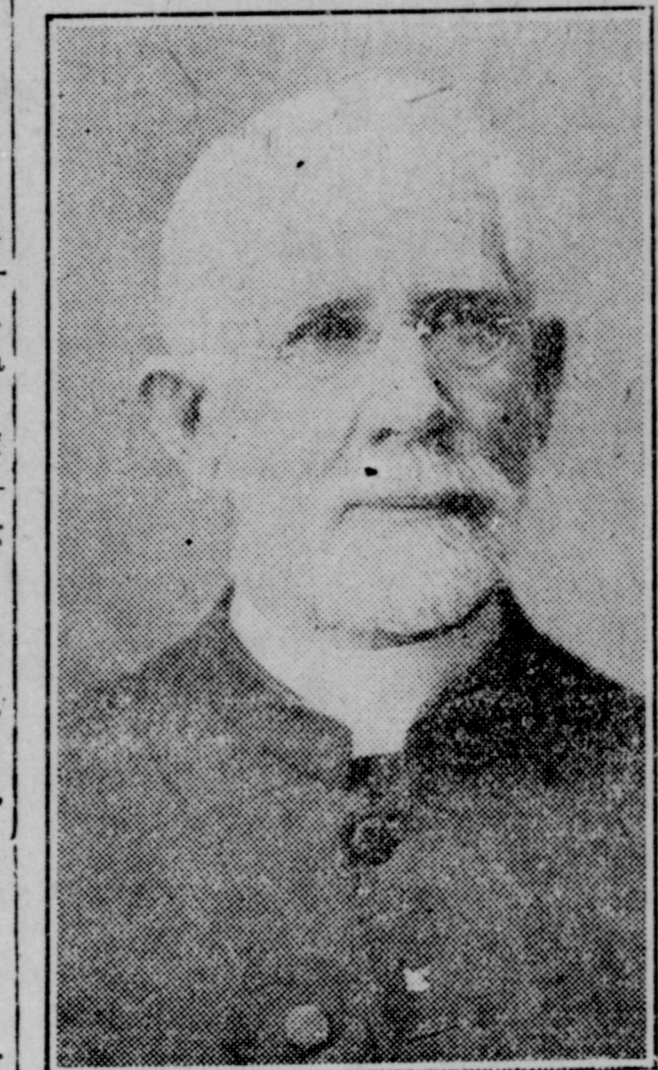

The Local Military Getting Ready—List of Volunteers is Growing—Instructions Received to Commence Drilling—Men Are Now Under Pay

There is much stir in local military circles and enlistment is going on in every department of military organizations of the county.

Col. W. C. Good who was among the first to volunteer, received word yesterday that he had been accepted for foreign service. Instructions were received Thursday morning that in view of the completion of medical examinations officers will assemble for instructional purposes. The men will commence drilling at once and be under pay at authorized militia rates.
