## POTATOES FROM UNITED STATES IN TORONTO MARKET

Freight Rate on New Brunswick Potatoes so Great That Advantage of Duty is Overcome—Uncertainty Among Shippers

(Mail.)

Ex-Ald. W. W. Boyce, a prominent produce shipper of this city, yesterday received word that potatoes from the United States had come into the Toronto market in such quantities that the market had become disorganized and the buyers are very uncertain as to what course to pursue. This is liable to affect local prices, as the Toronto market is what has been taking exports from this place during the past spring. The price this morning paid by shippers was \$1.50 per barrel. It is expected to fall as the result of the word from Toronto.

Canada imposes a duty of twenty cents per barrel upon potatoes from the United States, but the freight-rate charged on potatoes shipped from Fredericton to Toronto is so high that the advantage given by the duty is lost to the local shipper.

The Upper Canadian market has been loudly proclaimed to be an efficient substitute for that in the United States, but it has its disadvantages and many of them. The present situation well illustrates the fact.

The songs used were such as were used in the prayer meeting conducted by the army party just before embarking on the ill-fated steamer. On the platform which was tastefully draped in mourning, for the occasion, were seated beside the officers in charge, Ensign and Mrs. Miller, three of the city clergymen in the persons of the Rev'ds. Messrs. Baird, Orchard and Archer, who each spoke very feelingly concerning the terrible loss the army had met with and assuring the army throughout that they had their heartfelt sympathy and prayers from the various churches they represented.

The officers in charge also spoke in brief but feeling words of the sorrow that had befallen their precious cause. The meeting was very impressive and deep silence rested upon all present.

The Woodstock Corps wishes to thank their many friends everywhere for their kindness and sympathy extended towards the army in this their great hour of sorrow.
