

GUTHRIE WINS IN FACTION FIGHT

Money Used to Elect Machine Candidate

The Breach Between the Two Tory Factions Considerably Widened

With every polling place heard from the vote in Thursday's provincial by-election stood Guthrie, 3,010; Scott, 2,471. Mr. Guthrie's majority unofficial, 539. Frederickton gave Mr. Guthrie a majority of 176; Kingsclear a majority of 136, and Marysville a majority of 54.

The Liberals generally throughout the County stayed away from the polls, regarding the contest as one between two factions of the Conservative Party. Scott's supporters say that money was used at the polls in large amounts to elect Guthrie. The influence of both the Provincial and Dominion Governments was against the independent candidate, and the officials of both Governments worked against him on the stump and otherwise.

The breach between the two factions of the party in this County is widened as a result of the election, and it is doubtful if it ever can be healed. H. F. McLeod, M. P., who made this by-election his own personal contest stood at the poll at Canterbury Stat on where Mr. Scott also stood. McLeod's candidate was beaten at that poll.

Dr. O. E. Morehouse, M. P. P., and James K. Pinder, M. P. P., supported Scott, and John A. Young, M. P. P., supported Guthrie. All three gave majorities for the respective candidates at their own polls. Lively times in the Provincial Legislature are forecasted for the session which will begin on Thursday.

Four Men Killed on Branch Railway

Four men were instantly killed and five or six injured on the Moncton & Buctouche Railway on Friday as the result of two engines, a plow and a car going through a bridge at Scotch Settlement, twelve miles from Moncton.

The dead are: Frank N. Hall, general superintendent, age 48 years; Gideon Smith, locomotive engineer, age 45 years; George Freeman, fireman aged 25 years; Sylvan Bourque, aged 23 years.

The injured are: Alexander McKie, locomotive engineer, left arm and left leg broken, internally injured; William Basterache, temporary employee of the railway, severely bruised and shaken up; L. Richards, temporary employee, badly cut about the head; Conductor John McFadden and brakeman McIntosh each had a leg badly injured.
