PARCEL POST A DELUSION AND A SNARE

Hedged About by Many Limitations—Is a Cold Brick—Will Not be of Any Use in Effecting a Reduction in Cost of Living

(From the Montreal Herald-Telegraph.)

No surprise need be evinced at the fact that the inauguration of the parcel post yesterday was more or less of a frost. The marked limitations of the system, and the many restrictions by which it is hedged about, seem to be especially designed to prevent it from becoming popular.

In the United States the parcel post was an overwhelming success from the very first day. There the system was drawn up with an eye to the demands and requirements of the people. Here the underlying principle seems to have been to prevent a measure universally demanded from being harmful to "the interests."

This is quite in keeping with a statement made by Mr. Pelletier some months ago, when he intimated that the competition afforded by the parcel post was not intended to be a very severe matter. As it works out, Mr. Pelletier and his colleagues seem to have done just what the Liberals feared when they objected in the House of Commons to a blanket endorsement of a parcel post system. If Mr. Pelletier had submitted the outlines of his proposed system to the Commons for discussion, he would have had the help of representatives from all over Canada in drafting and revising regulations universally acceptable. But he has drawn up his measure in secret—and now finds that it is received by the country with indifference.

That the parcel post will be of little use in effecting a reduction in the cost of living is perfectly evident to anyone who will study its provisions. Housewives who have had visions of chickens and other farm produce coming in regularly by parcel post may as well dismiss these at once. All such things will have to be produced within 20 miles of the Montreal Post Office; the parcel post rate for any distance beyond that is considerably more than the existing express rate.

In the United States, where they have something like a real system, the rates are based upon distance. While the first zone in Canada is only 20 miles, the first zone in the United States at the start was 50 miles, and has since been extended to 150 miles. Then again, in the United States the weight of parcels in the 150-mile radius has been raised to 55 pounds, while in Canada, the weight is limited to 6 pounds for a 20-mile radius—for the first three months, and after that to eleven pounds. In addition there are provincial complications in the Canadian system from which the American system is entirely free.

How the rates beyond the 20 miles zone in Canada work out in comparison with those in the United States is shown by the fact that while in Canada it would cost 46 cents to send a parcel 100 miles by parcel post, our own express companies would do it for 40, and the United States post office would carry it for 14 cents.

This is the sort of parcel post system which the Borden Government has foisted on the country as

its contribution to the work of reducing the cost of living. It is a gold brick—and not a very handsome one at that.

A HERO

Last summer political friends brought before the notice of the Royal Humane Society the fact that B. F. Smith had rescued a lad from drowning. On the strength of the claims presented a medal was granted Mr. Smith. Last week the formal presentation was made—political friends figuring in the affair almost exclusively.

With all mawkish sentiment thrown aside, and assuming that instead of B. F. it was plain John Smith who "at the risk of his own life" plunged in and fished a boy out of the stream, the story would never have gone five miles away from Florenceville. B. F. Smith's a man whom the Conservative party is endeavouring to rehabilitate, to make a hero and a sort of demi-god, that he may yet serve a useful political purpose.

When Mr. Smith performed his act of "heroism" he was but doing his obvious duty. What man or, for that matter, what woman, would see a child fall into the river without trying to help him out? And need it be considered at all dangerous to plunge into the St. John river, 20 feet from shore, in midsummer? Those who have tried to make a hero of Mr. Smith spoke of his "taking his life in his hand, disregarding his own safety." Mr. Smith, himself, will not say that at any moment when he was rescuing the boy did he feel that his own life was the least bit in danger. Indeed, an eye witness states the rescue took place in two feet of water.

TWENTY YEARS AGO

February 24th, 1894

The storm of the season, indeed the storm of many seasons, commenced here on Thursday, in the evening of which day the snow bearing wind blew a gale and was intensely bitter. As a result of this snow fall and wind storm, which extended over a wide area, the railroads were entirely blocked on Friday, and it was only after the most strenuous exertions, and the use of all available appliances, that the many stalled trains on main lines and branches were relieved and the regular train service, in a measure, resumed on Saturday. It was not until Monday that, on the Grand Falls and Gibson branches, the blockade was raised.

It is many years since there has been such an accumulation of snow in Town and neighboring country; in the latter the roads were rendered for a time impassable.

On Sunday there was quite a heavy fall of rain which settled the snow considerably.

As stated last week, the contract for the superstructure of the new bridge has been closed. \$42,487.00 is the contract price. The work is to be completed by the 15th of August next, the contractors forfeiting \$25 per day for every day thereafter during which the work is not completed. None of the parties tendering for the work would undertake to complete it at an earlier date than that provided for in the accepted tender.

The thirtieth anniversary of the establishment of the order of Knights of Pythias, was celebrated here, by Ivanhoe Lodge No. 7, by a supper at Williamson's, on Monday evening, after the adjournment of the Lodge. Some thirty Knights sat down to an excellent oyster supper, Chancellor Commander H. P. Baird occupying the principal chair with grace and dignity, supported by Vice-Chancellor T. A. Lindsay.
