GOULD WANTS \$4,000,000 FOR NEW RAILROAD

Urged to Protest Against Passage of Bill

(Aroostook Pioneer)

In the Senate of the Maine Legislature on Feb. 16th, there was presented by Mr. Burleigh of Aroostook a bill authorizing the County of Aroostook to loan its credit to the amount of \$4,000,000 to aid in the construction of the Quebec Extension Railway. This bill was referred to the Aroostook County delegation and a hearing on the same is to be had in the Senate Chamber, at Augusta, on Tuesday, March 2nd, at 7.30 p.m.

In this bill the people of Aroostook County are asked to furnish a guarantee of the payment of \$4,000,000 in bonds of the Quebec Extension Railway, together with the interest thereon at four and one-half per cent for a term of fifty years.

As we understand it, the only sources of revenue which this road can hope to secure, depends on future development of this wilderness

region and some transcontinental freight which it might possibly divert from the Canadian roads, the latter being decidedly problematical.

Every voter in Aroostook county should write his representative and senator a personal letter protesting against the passage of this bill. As the hearing is next Tuesday attend to it at once. There is grave danger in delay. The time is short, but it will be much easier to kill the measure in committee than in referendum. A postage stamp sent now may save you many dollars later.

AMERICAN BAN ON CANADIAN POTATOES AGAIN

Claim New Brunswick Shipment Had Powdery Scab—Order in Effect Today

Ottawa, March 5.—Hon. Mr. Burrell minister of agriculture, in December last made an arrangement by which permits were to be issued to shippers of Canadian potatoes, allowing potatoes to enter the United States. This arrangement was to continue so long as there was no powdery scab found in any of the shipments.

Unfortunately the United States inspectors have reported that they have found powdery scab in a shipment of potatoes from New Brunswick to Boston, and have given notice to the department of agriculture that no Canadian potatoes would be permitted to enter the United States from Canada after March 5, instant.

The potatoes complained of in Boston, were immediately purchased for export from Boston, and there was no difficulty, insofar as the quality was concerned, with the country to which they were to be exported. The department of agriculture is investigating to ascertain if the statements made by the United States inspectors have any foundation.

Government Should Assist The Farmer By Taking Duty Off Plant Food

The Duty on Fertilizer Has Been Increased

Very much is being said at the present time about Patriotism and Production. The columns of the Agricultural papers are full of suggestions as to the best methods of increasing production.

Meetings are being held all over Canada under the auspices of the Department of Agriculture. Competent men are being sent to speak at them. Among the suggestions is that bank loan money to farmers who need assistance for a period of eight or more months and other ideas which I will not refer to now.

As agriculture is the foundation of all prosperity it is up to the government to deal promptly and liberally in that interest.

In the mind of the writer one of the best methods the government can adopt to further production is by assisting the farmer (and especially the farmers of eastern Canada) in getting cheaper commercial fertilizer.

We cannot grow big crops without fertilizer from some source. As we need far more than what barnyard manure is available a judicious use of the commercial fertilizer is very necessary.

But what has the Dominion Government done in the matter? By the new tariff they have increased the duty. Formerly it was 10 per cent. They have added 7½ per cent, which makes an increase of 75 per cent.

As potash is abnormally high owing to conditions caused by the war the increased duty is entirely unwarranted and at the same time detrimental to national prosperity. Let me say in passing that the farmers are getting aroused to the fact that their best interests cannot be served in Parliament by too many representatives of other professions. The most capable of these men (even were they disposed) cannot be expected to know the very conditions against which the farmer is contending.

I read that no country in the world except Canada imposes a duty on plant food. The United States, a high tariff country, admits plant food free.

The German government has agents in the United States who buy large quantities of phosphate (to be used at home with their cheaply produced potash) in the making of fertilizers. They have done more than that, they have made fertilizers preferred.

Little wonder is it then that the German farmer has become such a heavy producer. Why not our government consider this proposition of preferred freight.

It appeals strongly to me the least the government can do is to abolish at once the entire duty and make plant food free.

I trust the delegates at the F. and D. Convention at Fredericton will discuss this matter and pass a resolution to be forwarded to Ottawa to this end.

Let me say in conclusion I am not writing about this with political intent but from the standpoint of a pressing need in the farmers interest in producing a larger and better crop.

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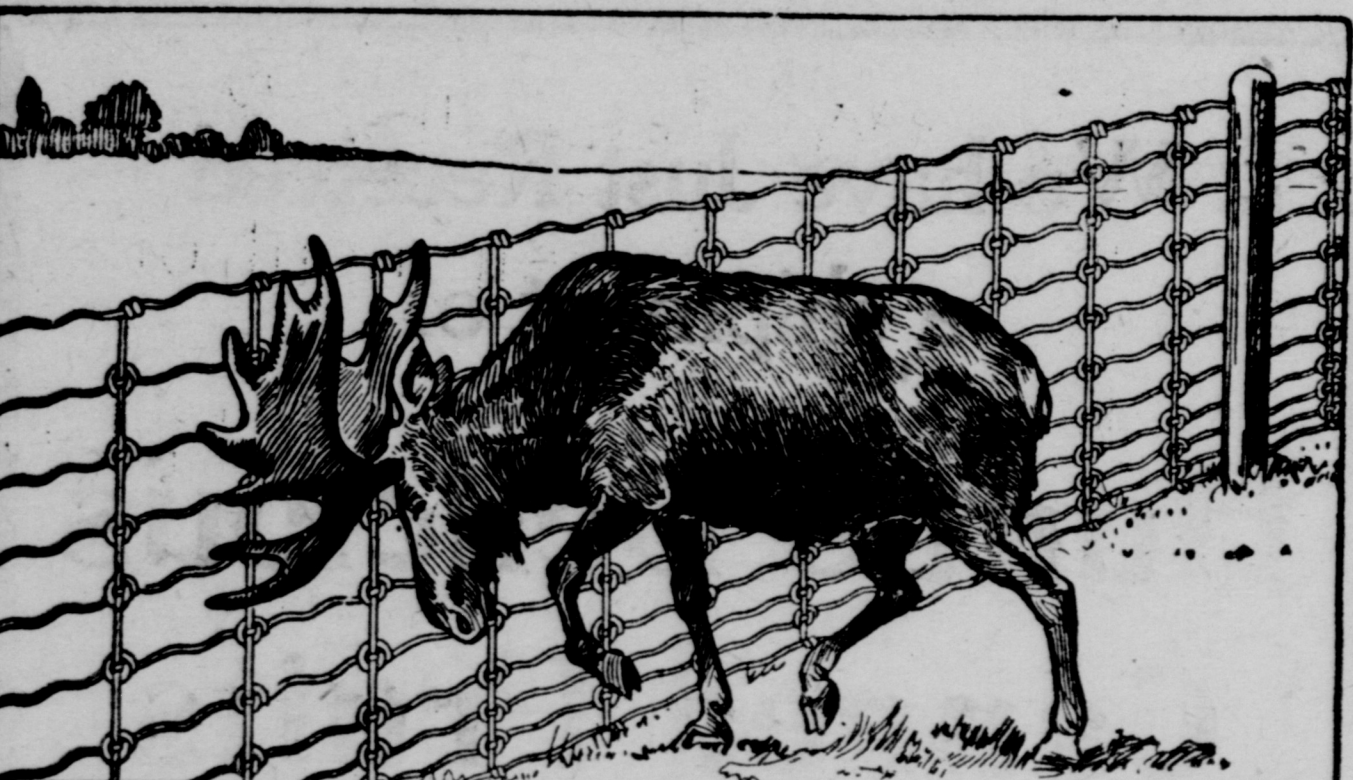
