WHAT HAS HAPPENED

A Concise Outline of the Trend of Events That Have Transpired in the War Zone

The Prussian losses alone up to Aug. 24th are placed at 1,740,836.

It is reported that Roumania has ordered officers at present abroad to rejoin their regiments.

Sir Henry Lucy, in an article in the New York Sun, estimates the British forces now in France at one million.

Gold to the value of 20,000,000 and securities valued at \$35,000,000 arrived in New York Sunday to be placed to the credit of the British Government.

Conquests of German possessions in Africa and the Pacific Ocean have added 3,000,000 square miles, almost equal to the whole of Canada, to the British possessions.

The awful price which is being paid for the Dardanelles is indicated by the fact that in eight days there were 800 casualties among British and Australasian officers alone.

A despatch to a Chicago paper asserts that the British have cut the line between Constantinople and the Turkish defenders of the Dardanelles and that the surrender of the latter is a certainty of the near future.

King Albert declares that as a result of the coming of recruits from abroad, and enlistment even from within territory still held by Germany, the Belgian army is actually stronger than it was on the outbreak of war.

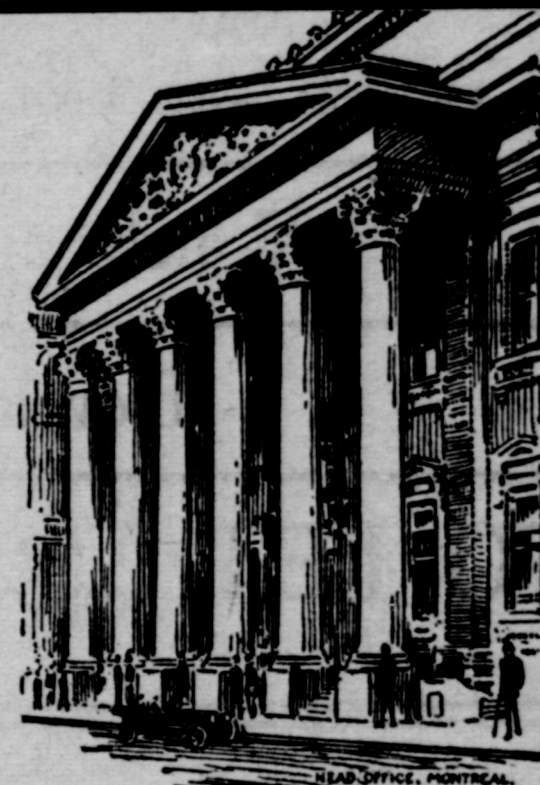
