LOCAL AND PERSONAL

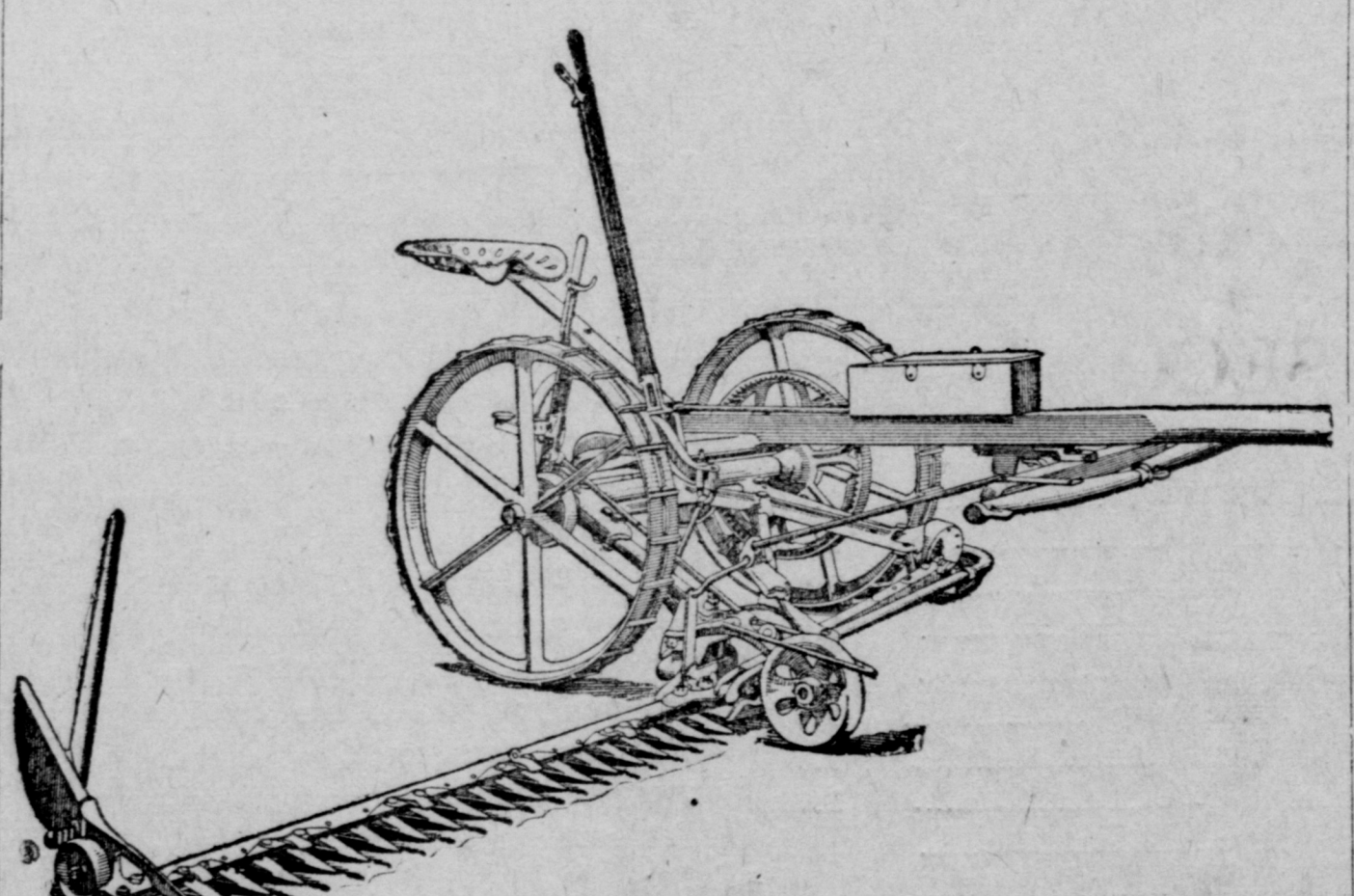
