Mrs. J. E. T. Lindow and two children, of Newcastle, who have been spending the past month with Mrs. F. B. Drysdale have returned home.

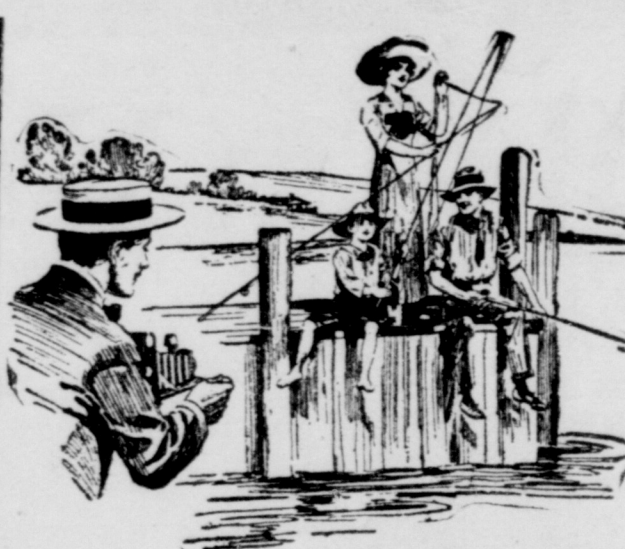
