## New Brunswick Gov't Sells More Debentures

**Money to Pay Off Old Debts—\$150,000 Went Into Pockets of Potato Grafters—The Potato Deal Biggest Fraud of All—Alarming Situation**

(MacL.)  
Announcement is made in the upper province papers that the government of New Brunswick has succeeded in disposing of \$700,000 in five per cent. gold debentures. The new loan has been placed at five per cent and the interest yield to the purchasers of the debentures will be 5 1/2 p.c. The explanation is made that the proceeds of the issue will be used for the construction of permanent bridges and for contributions to the imperial government. It would be more correct to say that the money will be

used to pay off temporary loans already made for the construction of permanent bridges. The present government always spends the money first and borrows it afterwards. In regard to the contributions to the imperial government, it is presumed that this has reference to the famous gift of potatoes made last year. It will be remembered that the sum of \$75,000 was raised by the lieutenant governor's warrant to pay for one hundred thousand bushels of potatoes for the use of the army and navy "given as a token of our loyalty to the Motherland". The potatoes and the work of sorting, barreling and shipping them cost about double what it should have cost and the result was that a second seventy-five thousand dollars had to be raised by means of a lieutenant governor's warrant. Now \$150,000, a large proportion of which went into the pockets of grafters and hangers-on of the administration, is to be added to the permanent debt of the province, as a mortgage on the property of the people, and this and future generations must pay interest on it. There never was a bigger fraud put over on the people of this province than this patriotic potato deal, conceived and carried out by the local government.

The floating of this new loan has served one good purpose—it has made

public some information which Mr J. L. Stewart, M.P.P., was unable to obtain at the last session of the House notwithstanding a solemn promise made to him by Hon. Dr. Landry, the provincial secretary-treasurer. Mr Stewart was promised a statement of the amount of the public debt, but he did not get it. The underwriters who are floating this loan, however, have been officially informed that the net debt of the province is the enormous sum of \$8,447,233. This statement was probably made up at the close of the fiscal year, which ended on October 31. The public debt usually develops rapidly during the early part of the winter and it is to be presumed that this will be the case this year. There will be a further boost to the debt when schemes for permanent roads and reclassification of crown lands are launched, if they ever reach that stage.

The present government went into power pledged to economy, but in less than eight years it has more than doubled the public debt. The annual interest charge in 1907 was \$173,000, but next year it is going to be pretty close to the \$400,000 which is equivalent to more than one dollar per head. This takes no account of the interest which will

## BORDEN GOV'T INDULGE FREELY IN 'TRUCK AND TRADE WITH YANKEES'

Major General Sir Sam Hughes Does Business to Amount of One Hundred Millions of Dollars—Tory Grafters Put Out of Business by Special Commissioner D. A. Thomas—Yankee Making Submarines in Montreal—A Better Article Than Sir Richard McBride's Seattle Purchase—Finance Minister White Borrows \$40,000,000 in New York at 5 per cent.

Ottawa, Nov. 25.—The irony of fate has ironed out pretty smooth most of the objections raised by the Borden Government to the freer trade policy advocated by the Liberals, in 1911. In fact for a timid flock of let-well-enough-aloners the Borden Government has indulged rather freely in that truck or trade with the Yankees, which was the object of their reproaches only four years ago. Of course they can urge that it was the Mother Country showed them the way, but that only proves that the Mother Country has a lot of common sense—simply that and nothing more.

It took awhile to jolt things loose, but once a start was made events moved quickly enough. For instance, Major General Sir Sam Hughes, at the request of the Borden Government, organized a Purchasing Committee in New York which trucked and traded with the Yankees to the extent of one hundred of millions of dollars for guns, cartridges, rifles, shells and things like that. This wholesale truck and trade with the Yankees on behalf of the British Empire was not only countenanced but actually encouraged and materially assisted by the Canadian Minister of Militia who took the deep-
