MILITARY NOTES
OF LOCAL INTEREST

Wm. Sutton, who went with the first contingent, as a member of the 67th Regiment, has been seriously wounded, although his name has not yet appeared in the casualty list. A letter received here from one of the Red Cross nurses this week says he will recover.

Lieut. Hamilton received order on Thursday to proceed at once to Sussex and accompany what recruits were there to Valcartier. He left on the evening train taking four recruits with him. The following day four others visited the armory but were unable to enlist as no recruiting officer was left in Lieut. Hamilton's place.

Sergt. Phillips and Pte. Harley Watson of the 55th were here for the week end.

One of the Woodstock boys at Valcartier in an interesting letter to his mother says in part:

"Your letter received and it was a treat. There is nothing like a letter from home. It is not certain whether we will leave here or not, but the only thing we can do is to hope. We have been out to the rifle range the last few days and you can be assured it is some sport shooting. You are required to make 15 points out of 25—if you don't you are sent back to the school of instruction. My score was very good and I think I will be able to pass. We are using the Ross rifle—called Mark 3 Ross—and it is a corker. It has the battle sight, which allows you to shoot 200 yards and the peep sight for 1000 yards or over, and a wind gauge which is set according to how hard the wind is blowing. This can be set 20 feet off the target and the wind will carry so it would hit the bulls-eye."

Jimmy Inches, of St. Stephen, was with us for a week in Sussex but on account of bad teeth was turned down. I just had a card from him and he said, "I had 15 teeth extracted and it hurt some—I will be with you in a short time."

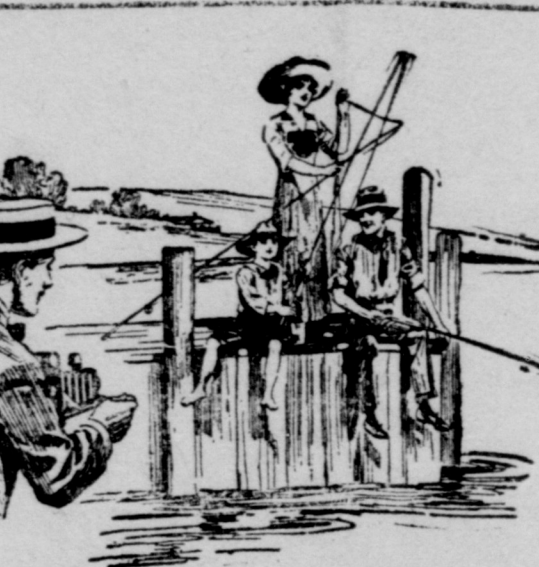
