Membership Largest in Province—Working For the Soldiers—An Exhibition of Needlework Oct. 14th

At the monthly meeting held on Wednesday last it was decided to hold a social evening, with exhibition of needlework and other handicraft, on Thursday, Oct. 14th, at 8 p.m., in the Vocational School. This work, done by members of the Institute, was recently exhibited in Fredericton, and much admired. An admission fee of ten cents will be charged, and tea and sandwiches will be served to those wishing to attend. The meetings of this branch are well attended and prove most interesting. At the last one, Mr. C. McDonald, manager of the Royal Bank, gave an excellent talk on "What women should know about banking." The membership is now seventy-nine, the largest in the province. The ladies have undertaken to do some work for the soldiers, and this week handed in to the local Red Cross Society their first parcel, a good sized one, consisting of 14 sheets, 23 pillow cases, 3 feather pillows, a large bundle of old cotton and linen, bandages, tape, safety pins, linen thread, paper bags, etc., for use in the hospitals.

SINISTER INFLUENCES

That the Nationalist grip on the Government is stronger than ever is now emphasized by the fact that Mr. Blondin, who will be remembered for the speech in which he told French Canada that it was sometimes necessary to shoot holes in the British flag in order to breathe the air of liberty, has now been elevated to the proud position of Secretary of State for Canada. On October 10, 1911, when the composition of the Borden Cabinet was announced, the leading Conservative paper in Montreal declared that "Sinister influences have been granted admission to the Privy Council Chamber at a time when they might have been rigidly excluded, and this fact does not alone make for reassurance." That pronouncement is even more true to-day than it was in 1911.—Montreal Herald.
