LIFE IN THE TENT HOSPITALS

Interesting Extracts from Letters of Miss Margaret Dibblee—Happiness Next to Physical Welfare—Tired Souls Enjoy Their Beds—Reading Material, Tobacco and Writing Paper are Appreciated—Canadians and English Best Soldiers

Miss Margaret Dibblee writes interestingly to her mother describing the hospital service with which she is connected. Miss Dibblee, who is a member of the Canadian staff of nurses, is a keen observer and her letters are always full of deep interest. The following extracts are from letters just received:

We are working in our tent hospital and are living in our tents too. It is rather shivery on the whole but really as comfortable as one could expect tent life to be. We have our little village of tents all laid out. The wards are made of seven sections, one tent opening into another, with the sisters dressing tent and office in the centre. The wards are arranged as much in a circle as possible. The O. C. is a Doctor Bridges of Fredericton.

We have such nice boys in our ward, English, Irish and Scotch. The scotchman has entertained us this afternoon with some nice advent hymns. Wasn't it a funny combination, but he says he has religion. He has a very good voice and really seemed to sing from his heart. All the other boys had a drink of stout so I gave him an orange and he seemed quite content so you see he really is religious. He is a funny sort too and I am usually in fits of laughter at his droll sayings when I am doing his dressing. Another chap plays the mouth organ very well so we had quite a concert. Everyone was happy at any rate and that is the main point I think next to their physical welfare. I do not know if the former does not come first anyway.

The homesteaders have done the most wonderful work—the marquee or recreation tent and mess tent have waxed floors which they did themselves, and in the first one, nice steamer chairs, a very pretty divan a few tables and altogether a very

pretty room. The mess tent also looks attractive, one long table and two smaller ones. The sisters pick flowers for the tables, and though the china is very ordinary it is very pretty.

I wonder what kind of news you are hearing about the war. I would like to see today's home papers which cannot praise our men enough—they have been simply wonderful in this last movement. We had a few Canadians come in our ward last night and it was quite funny to see our English Tommies jealousy; they were almost keen to get back to show what they might do if they had a chance. The poor souls who did come in last night have slept practically all day; they are just tired out and enjoying their beds more than anyone you ever saw.

I think if I ever hear anyone complain at home about food or any trivial discomforts, I will feel very angry with them. There is not one person in Woodstock who knows what discomforts mean. Don't for a minute think I am alluding to any thing about myself, for we are as comfortable as camp beds, oil stoves tents, etc., permit and our patients are all comfortable I think too, as comfortable as wounded and sick men can be.

Have the people at home ever donated writing paper; that is one of the things the men need a great deal of. The Red Cross have sent us a heap of splendid things which have been most appreciated, but they, the men I mean, cannot get enough or too much reading material and tobacco, writing paper and chocolate. No sacrifice which can be made by the people at home can be too great for the wonderful men who are over here responding to their country's call. It is an acknowledged fact that the Canadians and English are making the best soldiers, one would think I was wound up but one has a different feeling about it all when ones own are in the thick of it and are being praised by almost the whole world, though Germany is quite an important part of it.

If I ever had to care for a wounded German I would certainly try to master enough German to tell him what I thought of him.
