NO TRUTH IN THE CHARGES AGAINST PREMIER NORRIS

Royal Commission Reports That They are Absolutely Unfounded and the Trumped Up "Liberty" Story Is Finally Exploded—The Honor of the Liberal Government of Manitoba is Completely Vindicated—Judges Refuse to Take Howden's Word

Winnipeg, July 30.—That the charges made by the C. P. Fullerton, K. C., on behalf of fourteen private members of the Legislature, were unfounded, is the finding made by the Royal Commission, of which Mr. Justice Proulx is the chairman, and made public at eleven o'clock today. The Commissioners report that "it is impossible to say that the negotiations which attended the resignation of the Roblin Government were in any degree improper or unfair."

"There is no evidence whatever," says the report, "for connecting Winkler or any other member of the Opposition with the first charge. Unless Norris is proved to have been connected with the charge it must fall altogether. Whether or not he was implicated turns upon the question, who of the two, Howden or Norris, is to be believed, as to what took place at the interview between them."

NORRIS TOLD THE TRUTH
"Without regard," says the Commissioners, "to impracticabilities in the narrative of Howden, upon which they themselves cast grave doubts, we base our acceptance of Norris' statement upon the respective characters of the two men as revealed by the evidence. The members of this Commission unhesitatingly accept Norris' account of what

took place at the interview in question."

The Commissioners point out that when the \$25,000 was received by Chambers, the Mathers Commission had commenced its inquiry. The position of the Government at that time was very serious, it is stated, and "it is, therefore, scarcely credible that Howden, or the persons behind him who furnished the money, would pay \$25,000 to obtain the dismissal of the protests when the Government, as they must have known, was on the eve of resigning."

"Further, when he found Chambers could not arrange matters, Howden refused to take back the money, and he continued to refuse even after the Government had resigned."

THE ROGERS PLOT EXPOSED

"The opinion we form," continued the Commissioners, "after a careful consideration of the evidence is that even if the money dealing in regard to the dismissal of the election protests was Howden's intention in the first place, and even if the money was paid in Chambers' hands to enable him to make the attempt to secure the removal of the protests, the plan was conceived during the passage of the matter by Howden and those acting in concert with him, whereby Norris should by some means be connected with Chambers and implicated in the receipt of money. When it was believed that the purpose of the plan had been effected, rumors in regard to the money dealing had spread."

They found no evidence whatever to support the charge that the second \$25,000 was paid to anyone in connection with the change of Government."

The conference between A B Hudson and F. H. Phlippen concerning the resignation of the Government and the submission of proposals to Chief Justice Mathers is related to in this report.

"Both Chief Justices," say the Commissioners, "emphatically declare that the proposal did not contain any agreement that the Royal Commission was to be stifled, but only that under the existing circumstances, its labors might be suspended."

"Owing to some mistake, however, Sir Rodmond Roblin's letter of resignation did not contain any admis-

sion as to the correctness of Hudson's charges, as agreed upon, and the approval of the Royal Commission to the arrangement was never obtained."

"The Government resigned, as indeed was practically inevitable, and as in any case they intended to do, but the proposal which had been made was never consummated," the Commissioners added.

"In the light of the above evidence reads the concluding paragraph of the report, 'we find it impossible to say that the proposal in question, made at the time and under the circumstances detailed, was in any way improper or unfair. We think that all those who took part in it acted in good faith and that no wrong-doing is imputable to any of them. If the proposal had been carried out in its entirety, the examination of Thomas Kelly would have been secured long ago, and the departmental inquiry, under the direction of Hudson and his associates would doubtless have brought to light much of the evidence which has been brought out before the Royal Commission.'"

BECKER WENT TO HIS DEATH PROTESTING HIS INNOCENCE

SING SING PRISON, July 30.—Charles Becker was put to death in the electric chair here this morning, for the killing of Herman Rosenthal, the New York gambler. The former New York police lieutenant retained his composure and protested his innocence to the last. He went to his death with a photograph of his wife, pinned on his shirt, over his heart. Three shocks were given before the prison physicians pronounced Becker dead, at 5.55 o'clock.

LED THE WAY
Becker led the way to his own execution. The condemned man sat up all night on the edge of his cot,

calmly talking to deputy Chas. H. Johnson. The one time police officer hesitated as he entered the execution room. It seemed to the witnesses as if he was startled that the death chair was so near at hand. He looked quickly at the double row of witnesses, glanced at the floor, swept with his eyes the whitened walls of the room and then suddenly, as if coming to himself, walked briskly over the rubber mat and seated himself in the electric chair. Behind Becker followed the prison priests, chanting the prayer of death, which was repeated by the condemned man.

"Jesus, Mary, Joseph, have mercy on my soul," nervously spoke Becker as the Deputy Warden stepped forward and adjusted the electrode. He hardly had seated himself before the electrode was applied to the right leg, a slit having been previously cut in the trouser leg from the knee down. After the electrode had been firmly adjusted against a shaven spot on the back of the condemned man's head, the State Executioner looked at Deputy Warden Johnson, who surveyed the figure that was still muttering the death prayer. Johnson half turned his head and the executioner jammed the switch.

THE FIRST SHOCK
The first shock lasted a full minute and the executioner said that it was 1,850 volts and ten amperes in strength. It came while Becker was still commending his soul to his maker. The two prison physicians stepped forward to examine the collapsed figure that sat supported in the death chair by the thick black leather strap. The stethoscope was applied to his heart and Dr. Charles Farr, the prison physician pressed his finger against an artery in the neck. There was still a feeble fluttering of the heart.

The physician stepped back from the rubber mat and again the electric current pulsed through the body. The shock lasted seven seconds and the current was then turned off. After a thorough examination Dr. Farr asked that a third shock be given. This lasted five seconds. An examination that took several minutes followed. Three physicians among the witnesses, then made examination, and Dr. Farr, at 5.55 o'clock quietly announced "I pronounce this man dead."

HIS DECLARATION
During the night Becker pencilled on a piece of paper what he captioned "My dying declaration." It was (Continued on page seven.)
