Last season Alex McPherson of Presque Isle, Me., raised from thirty-one acres about 4,800 barrels of potatoes. For about 1,800 barrels he received an average of \$1.10 a barrel, and he sold the balance, with the exception of 800, at an average of 77 cents a barrel. He used 23 tons of fertilizer at \$35 a ton. In addition during the last year he has sold \$500 worth of beef and pork off his farm.
