

## WHAT HAS HAPPENED

### Concise Outline of the Trend of Events That Have Transpired in the War Zone

A German submarine was sunk last week by French and British warships.

The P. & O. liner Simla, serving in the Mediterranean as a transport, was sunk by an enemy submarine.

One person was killed and eight injured in a Zeppelin raid over England on Wednesday night.

French and British aviators brought down forty-two German planes on the western front during March.

Tuesday's dailies reported eight more vessels torpedoed, five of the victims being British.

Four Spaniards were drowned when a Spanish ship was torpedoed off the French coast last week.

Three German aeroplanes were brought down on the Anglo-French front inside of three days.

A peace meeting at Trafalgar Square, London, was broken up by a mob. The peace speakers were pelted and the surrounding banners torn.

From the beginning of the war to the end of March, Britain's losses in aviators were 150 killed, 150 wounded and 103 missing.

Spain has demanded an explanation from Germany of the sinking of the Sussex in which Spanish lives were lost.

Prince Nicholas of Greece, in a letter to an English friend, says Greece the verge of starvation by allied interference with her commerce.

Some Dutch vessels on the route from Holland to England carry 2,500 empty barrels in their holds to keep them afloat in the event of being hit by a submarine.

Six vessels were destroyed and two damaged by enemy mines or submarines last week. The engineer and eight Lascars sailors were lost with one of the vessels.

The British forces advancing to the relief of the garrison besieged at Kut-el-Mara made an advance of some three miles last week but were checked in attempting a further advance.

A score of prisons in England have been closed, or partially closed, as a result of the war. Increased employment, with consequent decrease in crime, is given as one reason. It is probable, however, that there, as here, minor offenders have been given a choice between the army and jail.

It cannot be too frequently or too earnestly impressed upon our people that the heaviest burdens of the conflict still lie before us, and that industry and thrift are, for those who remain at home, supreme patriotic duties upon whose faithful fulfillment our success, and consequently our national safety, may ultimately depend."

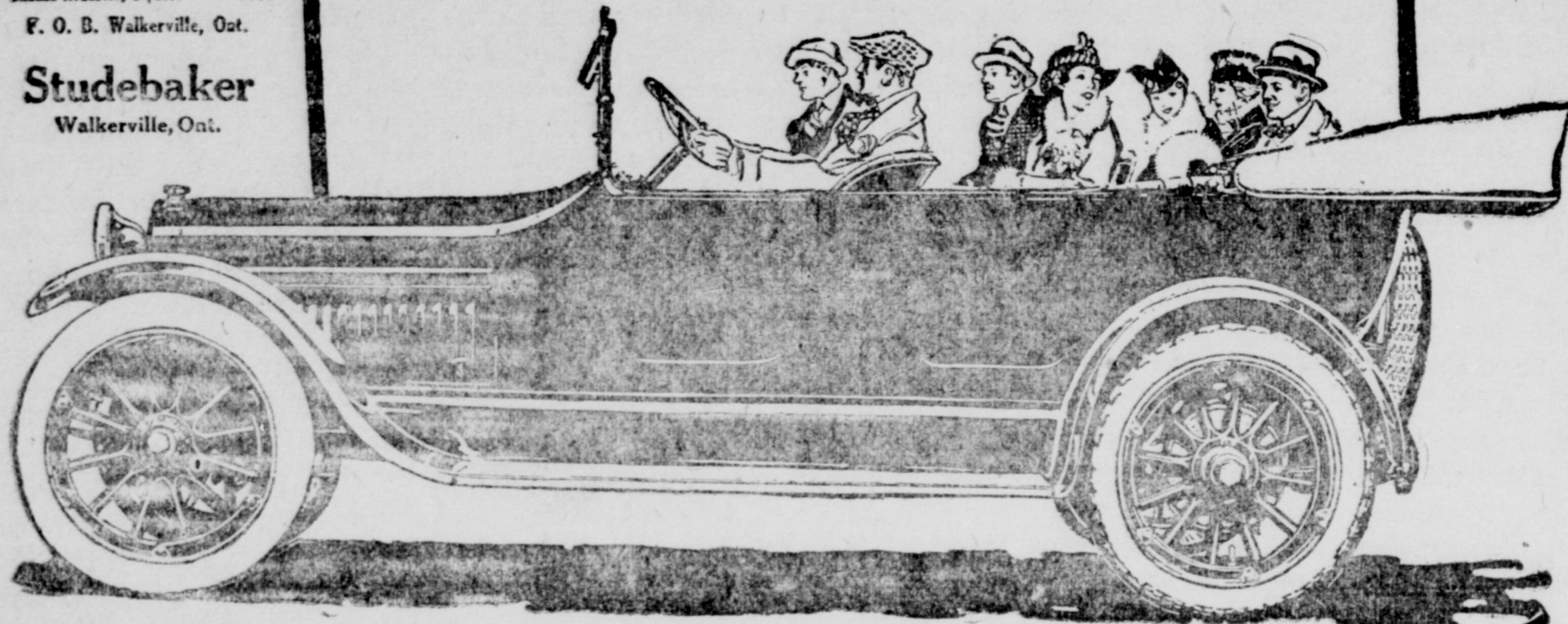

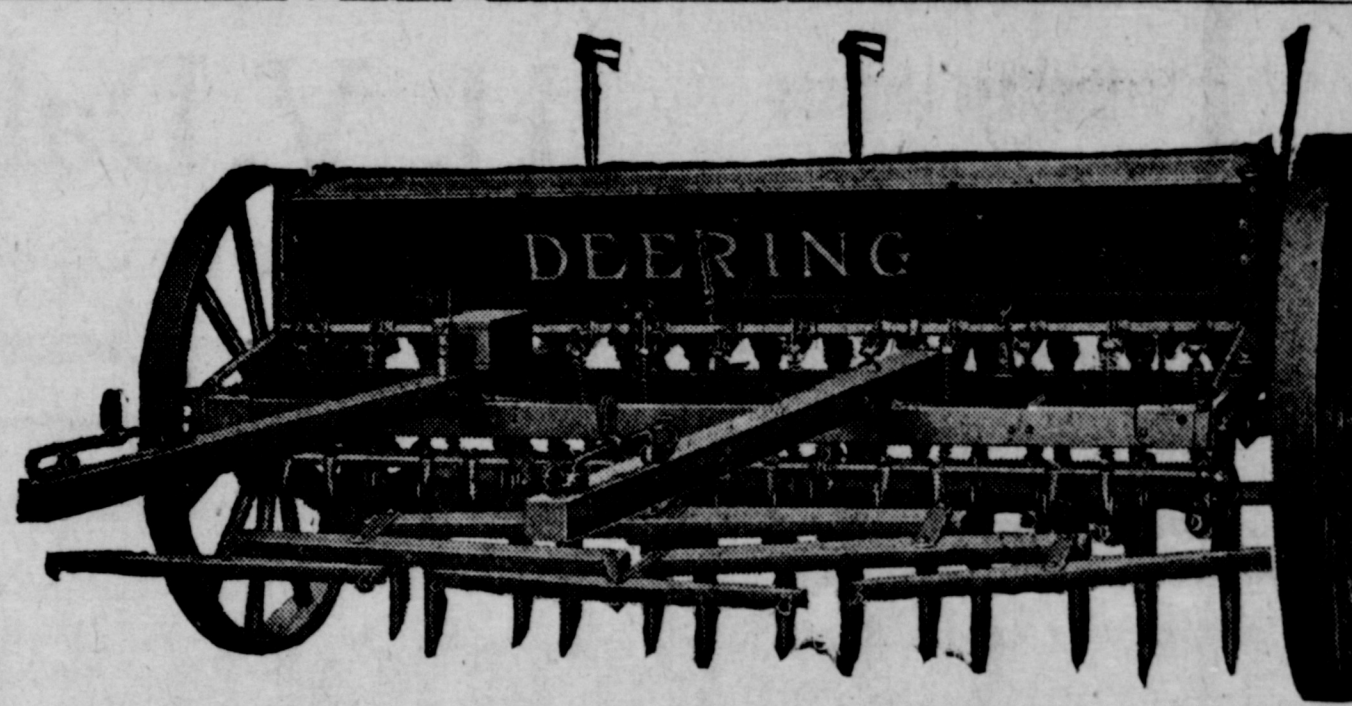
