## MILITARY NOTES OF LOCAL INTEREST

Pte. Methuen Good of D Company, 104th Battalion, Woodstock, who is visiting his home at Millville, York Co., is the third member of his family to don the khaki. One brother is somewhere in France and one drilling in Fredericton.

Gunner J. L. Hawkes, Plaster Rock, has been invalided home suffering from gas poisoning.

The Rev. F. M. Lockary has been appointed an honorary captain and chaplain, and posted for duty with General Landry's 11th Res. Infy. Brig., East Sandling, Eng.

Sergts Roach and Rogers are enjoying a few days leave, visiting in St. Stephen and Fredericton.

Sergt. Webber addressed the audience at the Bijou Friday. He made a strong appeal for recruits.

A young Woodstock soldier, of the 55th, writing to his mother, under date of April 2, says in part: "We have been marching to Shorncliffe every day for the past week practicing for the King's review. It's some walk to do every day—about 16 miles. We leave in the morning about 6 and get back at 3. Tomorrow is day of inspection and you bet we will all be there, as it is not every day we have a chance to see a King."

Our hut is out of quarantine and it is off the camp tomorrow. There was an air raid quite handy to us last night and the Inlaying Piquet was turned out at 1 o'clock. The Inlaying Piquet are men that

fall in at retreat and first post and are ready to turn out at a moment's notice. As luck had it I was not in it last night. They were served with ten sounds of ammunition and were out some time. There are 60 men from each company in this Piquet. Fortunately the Zeppelins did not get this far, though they were very near. Afterwards two were brought down by air craft and I think 24 killed and many injured.

The draft is here yet but expects a call any time."

Lieut. Nicholson was, on Saturday, presented by the members of No. 14 platoon with a cane and signet ring.

A recent letter from Shorncliffe brought the news that Col. H. F. McLeod, M.P., had been seized with another attack of pneumonia, and was seriously ill.

Sergt. Thomas Carter who left Fredericton with the 24th Battery arrived home Thursday night. He has been in an English hospital for some time. Many of the citizens, with the band, were at the station to meet him and escorted him to his home. He is improving slowly and hopes to soon be restored to his usual good health.

Major Lauchlan returned Tuesday from St. Stephen where he had been called by the death of his father.

A new infantry school will be opened in St. John April 25th, under Lieut. Corelli of the 104th Batt.

Co. "D" will organize a base ball team and expect to put a team on the diamond capable of meeting all comers. The opening game will probably be played with a town aggregation.

One of the newest orders issued to officers commanding shows the trend of modern warfare and raises the dignity of recruits in the ranks. It is the added responsibility that falls to the small man, the N. C. O. The order says: "It is most important that special attention should be paid to the formation of permanent sections." (Sections are quarter platoons and number about 15 men each.) "In organizing sections put friends together as much as possible. Train the section commanders to realize that they are responsible to the platoon commanders in just the same way as the platoon commander is responsible to the company commander." Each section commander is expected to know each man in his section as a good shepherd knows his sheep—and to be able to say right off without counting if the section is "all present" or not, and which man it is that is absent. The importance of this is pointed out that in trench work the fighting unit is so small that the whole efficiency of the battalion depends on this knowledge of the section. All this adds to the dignity and the value of the lower ranks.
