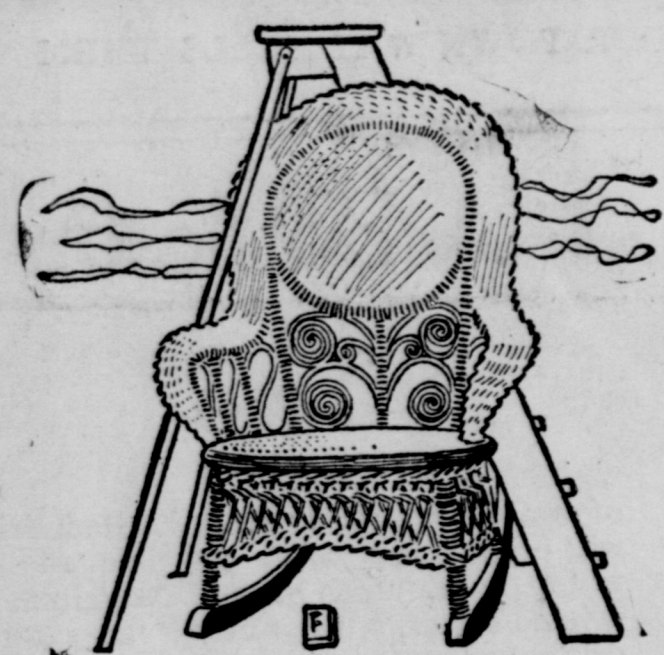

RETRIBUTION.

SECOND WAR ANNIVERSARY

Open air Meeting Largely Attended—Speakers arouse Enthusiasm—War will be carried to Successful Conclusion

The attendance at the patriotic ceremonies Friday, August 4th, was very large and deep interest was taken in the proceedings. The 65th Battery, with their bugle band, were present and also the 67th Regiment band. The exercises were held in front of the court house, at noon. A platform had been erected and very tastefully decorated with the flags of the Allies. Mayor W. B. Sutton presided. Mr. F. B. Carvell and Mr. T. C. L. Ketchum were the speakers. On the platform were seated Major Evans, Capt. Fisher, Capt. Barrie, Lieuts. Winslow and Boyer.

Mayor Sutton in a brief address said: "A year ago we met here in this very place and a resolution similar to that which we propose to pass today was presented for your approbation. Then, the outlook was serious. Our great ally Russia had been forced back. Bulgaria was on the verge of joining our enemies. The French and ourselves were fighting hard to hold our lines in the west. But no one for a moment thought that, even with these handicaps, the end could be but one way. Today we meet, feeling assured that the tide of war has turned. The general outlook is more than encouraging. It is an assurance of success. But we have to mourn countless valuable lives lost. Last year, I am reminded we called for three cheers for Kitchener. Kitchener is gone, but his work follows him."

Mr. Carvell in an eloquent and interesting address held the close attention of the audience, as he went over the two years of the great struggle in which it was the intention of Germany to dominate the world. As a consequence millions of precious lives and billions of money have been spent. "Great Britain," said the speaker, "is engaged in a war to make other nations carry out the principles of justice and honesty. Germany made an agreement that Belgium should be maintained as an independent state, this agreement was ignored and thrown away as a scrap of paper, causing a struggle that has staggered the world. We were not prepared, we were put on the defensive for nearly two years, but happily this condition has changed and we are now on the offensive along the whole line, and showing the world that Germany is not invulnerable. During all this terrific fighting we have never retreated, and are now showing the result of great organization. The stand of the French at Verdun is the admiration of the world. Canada has done well. We started with 20,000 men and have now reach 350,000. At the beginning of the war this would have been considered an impossibility. Let me impress upon you," said Mr. Carvell, "that the man who goes to the front—who takes his life in his hands, must be taken care of when he returns. It will mean increased taxation and perhaps some hardships, but these men must and will be looked after as they deserve. Germany will be taught to live as civilized people. There is no use talking peace unless it is made satisfactorily, and Germany put where such inhumanity will not happen again."

Mr. Carvell closed by moving the following resolution:

"That on this, the second anniversary of the declaration of a righteous war, this meeting of the citizens of Woodstock, N. B., records its inflexible determination to continue to a victorious end the struggle in maintenance of those ideals of Liberty and Justice, which are the common and sacred cause of the Allies."

Mr. T. C. L. Ketchum spoke of the strong terms of the resolution which was not of the Board of Trade order. It had a strong meaning. "Two years ago," said the speaker, "there was danger of the foe even in Woodstock, but Great Britain's fleet protected the shores of the whole Empire and we are safe. The Allies have done their part nobly and Great Britain is the 'daddy' of them all." I am glad that Mr. Carvell referred to the returning soldiers and those who have made the sacrifice. We can never repay them, but we must see that those returning are looked after and life be made worth living."

The meeting closed with cheers for the King, the boys in khaki and the Allies.

At Hartland Prof. W. F. Watson, Rev. H. S. Helps and Rev. N. Franchette delivered speeches to a large audience.

Addresses were made at Florenceville by Lieut. Harvey T. Teed, Revs. E. C. Jenkins, M. H. Manuel, G. A. Ross, Fr. Coughlan and B. F. Smith. The beautiful decorations were due to the energy and taste of Mr. F. T. Atkinson. A resolution was passed requesting a special session of the Municipal Council for the purpose of appropriating a sum of money to the Patriotic Fund to the amount of \$10,000.

REGULAR MEETING OF TOWN COUNCIL

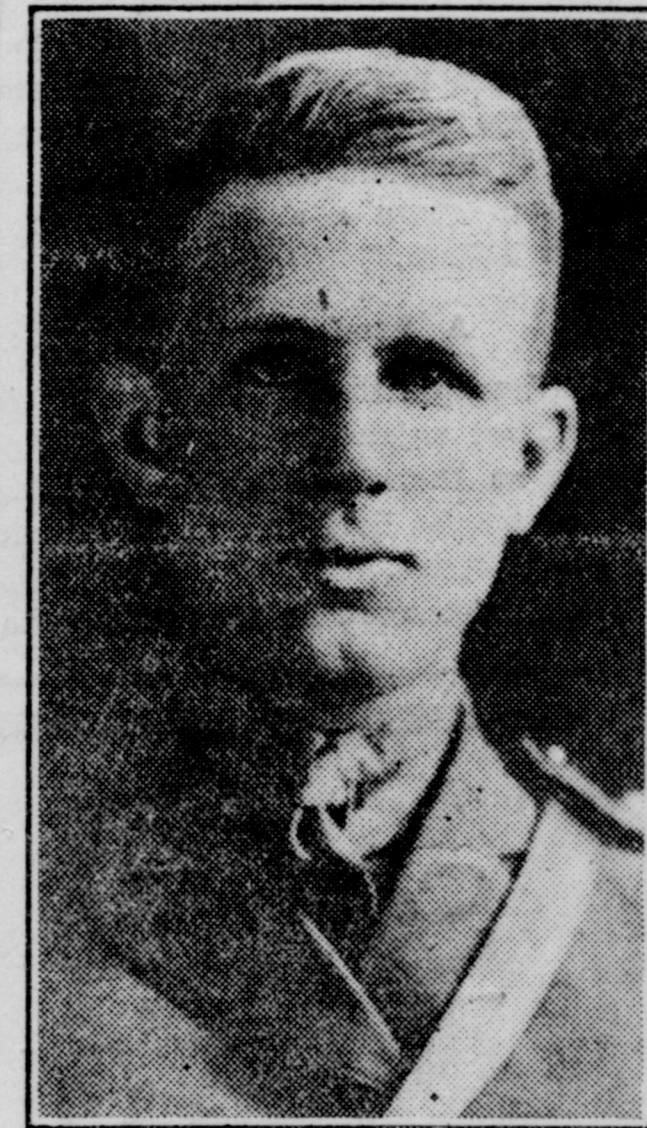
Reports Read—Delegation Work on Patriotic Fund—Heard on Connell Street cost \$440—Sidewalks will be Repaired

The town council met Monday night.

The reports of the Town Treasurer and Police Magistrate were read and referred.

On motion of Coun. Leighton the town clerk was instructed to write to Mr. C. W. Manzer of the C. P. R. that the company had not complied with Order No. 407,905 of Railway Commission and the town would not consider itself liable for the bill presented for June, 1916.

A committee from the Patriotic Fund was present and wished to be heard. Hon. W. P. Jones made a strong appeal on behalf of the Patriotic Fund. There will be a deficit in the New Brunswick contribution if funds are not forthcoming to pay the proportion required. \$25,000 has been apportioned to the county. There will be about \$10,000 with what is paid and due, leaving \$15,000 to be raised. We propose to ask for a special session of the County Council to make a grant. This council is asked to consider a grant of

Woodstock Boy writes of "Map" of Country

James Ketchum, in a recent letter to his father from somewhere in Belgium, says: "I hope you appreciate the circumstances under which my letters are written and make allowance accordingly. I have nothing to write on except a few hundred sheets of ordinary blank white paper and a wooden table. This letter is written in the dark, with the exception of two or three lighted candles, and on an empty stomach, if one ignores the four meals a day on steak, bacon, porridge, tea and coffee et al. So I hope you understand the difficulties I have to overcome in getting my weekly letter under way! I'd like to send you a copy of a map I saw the other day. It would give you a good idea of the country here, its soil, etc. He had been in a scrap with another Tommy and his face was covered with mud and when he opened his mouth an exact replica of any one of the famous craters and its surroundings appeared, made all the more apparent by the semblance of his bad teeth to decayed sandbags."

WHY CONSCRIPTION?

In order to make it fair and equitable to young men of right age and physically fit, instead of the way it is under the voluntary system whereby one young man is coerced into going and his neighbor ships into the good job left vacant by the willing recruit, and stays at home to teas, theatres, nickels, etc., while the voluntary recruit is ordered to Europe to tramp through mud and wet, endure all kinds of hardships, as much for the benefit of the boy left at home, as for the dependents of the voluntary fighter.

Looked at from a financial standpoint, the situation is fast reaching the stage whereby the cost to Canada must be considered, as it is already estimated at over twenty million dollars per month and steadily increasing.

If the young and single men were lined up in place of the married men with families, see how they could make themselves doubly valuable.

If a single man offers He saves Canada \$20.00 per month in separation money to begin with.

He saves Canada from \$5.00 to \$25.00 per month additional in Patriotic Fund money.

If he is called upon to give up his life:

He saves Canada from the Pension Fund, which from appearances is likely to grow to a very large additional sum!

From the above it is apparent that the young men would have a chance to show to Canada—that they realize all that Canada has been to them and this would be the opportunity for them to show WHAT THEY CAN BE TO CANADA, if given a fair, square deal from Coast to Coast, and all be treated alike by the Government of the Country.

HAND CUT OFF IN MILL

Defendant Liable for Injury

His Honour Mr. Justice McKeown at St. John on Friday last delivered judgment in the case brought by Thomas Pankhurst under the Workmen's Compensation for Injuries Act against Frederic W. Smith of Rockland. Judgment was entered in favor of the plaintiff for the full amount claimed, being three quarters of his average wages to be paid for a period of two years. The plaintiff was working in the defendant's mill and had his left hand cut off on a rip saw. The saw was not guarded and the judge held that the defendant was liable for the injury. Jones & Jones acted for the plaintiff and Messrs J. C. Hartley, K. C. and M. L. Hayward for the defendant.
