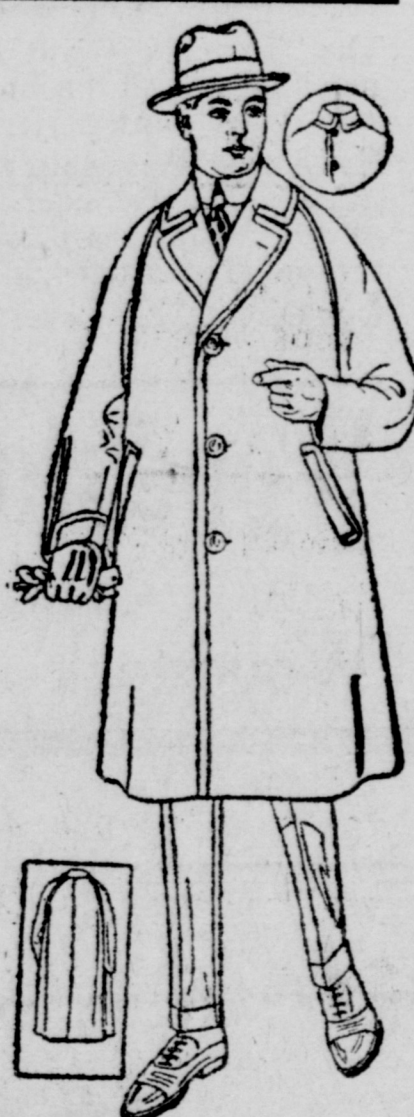

Rev. E. C. Jenkins of East Florenceville was the attending pastor and spoke from the text "Blessed are the dead that die in the Lord." The following hymns were beautifully rendered by the choir of the Baptist Church: "Asleep in Jesus," "Shall we Gather at the River," "Hear what the Voices from Heaven Proclaim!" The pall bearers were Charles Armstrong, John Rogers, Sanford Estabrooks and Oakman Boyer.

Interment was made in the family lot in the Baptist Cemetery at East Florenceville.
