TOWN FATHERS SPEND SESSION ON ESTIMATES

No more Experiments For Pure Water—Treasurer's Report

The council met Monday evening and made the first move towards fixing the estimates for 1916.

Considerable progress was made and every member of the board seemed anxious to keep the appropriations as low as possible, with reasonable service, owing to the conditions existing as a result of the war.

The bills were read and referred to audit committee. The Mayor and Town Clerk were authorized to overdraw at bank to amount of \$5,000. Coun. Stevens said complaints are made of boys stealing old iron from certain foundries and asked if law could not be enforced to prevent it.

Coun. Smith suggested that a license properly looked after would solve the matter. He also thought

parts would be lengthy. However the end men were good with J. Norman Loane and William Blake in the lead with a new set of 'gags'. Miss Stella McKinney and Miss Irma Jones quickly won the hearts of the audience with their songs which were rendered faultlessly. The drill of 50 young girls was very well done and served to introduce a number of young soloists which was an added interest.

The stump speech of Smiler Blake was a 'gem' and brought hearty applause from the big audience. Messrs. Brown and Roach in their sketch showed much painstaking work which was well received.
