The dramatic death of the commander of the Italian troops that stormed the Austrian second line trenches on Monte San Michele is described in a despatch to the Petit Parisien from its correspondent on the Italian front. The despatch says: "The enemy offered their most intense resistance at the second line trenches on Monte San Michele. Our men dashed forward at a run to find one trench still protected by wire entanglements. The commander of the attacking battalion said: 'Boys, we've got to pass.' Taking a hatchet he cut a passage through the wire calmly and deliberately. Just as he completed his task he fell into the arms of the soldiers, shot through the heart. But the breach had been made and the Italians swarmed into the Austrian lines."

OBITUARY

Macaulachlan, and her mother, Mrs. Newcombe, of St. John; one brother, Wallace, of Washington State, and a niece, Mrs. N. A. Hanson, of Andover.

The funeral took place on Saturday afternoon from the residence of Mr. J. A. F. Garden. After a short service at a house, the body was taken to St. Luke's church, the Rev. A. S. Hazel officiating.
