MILITARY NOTES OF LOCAL INTEREST

Ray Mooers, of the 104th, who has been dangerously ill, is recovering according to word received by his father this week. He is in an English hospital.

It is reported that Fred Buck who went over with the 55th, and was afterwards transferred to the 26th, will return home. He was seriously wounded shortly after going to France and has since been in the hospital.

Writing from England on Nov. 7, Pte. William Owens, of the 104th Battalion, advised that the unit was quartered at Whitley Camp, Surrey. The area within the 104th is now located in a much more desirable camp than Shorncliffe, in that it is solid, dry ground, and a most welcome change from the mud of Shorncliffe. The soldiers have access to good bathing facilities, and are equipped with stoves and a supply of coal for their tents.

Jack Chandler is recovering from his wound, received in the Somme fight, and when able will go to the artillery for which he is well qualified. He was in the 26th when wounded.

Hundreds of boxes of Christmas cheer have been sent to the boys in France and England by the churches and fraternal societies of Woodstock. Those who were not on the roll of any of the churches were remembered by the Methodist Church and to each one was mailed a well-filled box.

That upwards of twelve hundred full-blooded Indians have enlisted for overseas service since the war commenced, that one at least has received the military medal for bravery that the various reserves have contributed upwards of \$6,000 toward various patriotic funds, and that altogether the Indian population has evinced a gratifying spirit of loyalty are the most interesting features of the annual report of the Indian Department just published. It is also interesting to note that the Indian population has increased from 103,537 in 1915 to 105,571 in 1916. In all about 1,200 Indians have enlisted. They are distributed as follows: Ontario 2; Quebec 101; Manitoba, 89; Saskatchewan, 57; Prince Edward Island 24; British Columbia, 17; Nova Scotia, 14; New Brunswick 12; Alberta, 9; and Yukon, 2.

The condition of Private L. A. Dugal, son of Mr. L. A. Dugal, M. P. P., seriously wounded some weeks ago, with consequent amputation of his leg, is now reported by his nurse as quite reassuring and he is now reported out of danger. Tribute is paid to the young soldier's courage and pluck.

Friends of Lieut. Burpee Alexander formerly of Houlton, will be interested to know that he is now with the 97th regiment near Shorncliffe, Eng., and this regiment expects in a short time to be sent to the front. Mr. Alexander is the son of William Alexander of Houlton, and a graduate from the Houlton High school.—Houlton Pioneer.

The casualty list on Friday contains the name of Driver E. Haywood, Victoria, N.B., killed in action with the artillery.

Rev. J. B. Champion delivered a very able sermon on Sunday evening at Lakeville, the occasion being the Memorial Service held for the late Capt. Clarence Earl Williams.
