MILITARY NOTES OF LOCAL INTEREST

The base ball game Monday evening between the town team and Co. D team was full of excitement and was anybody's game up to the last inning. The excellent pitching of Fournier won the day for the town team. The score was 6 to 4.

The military authorities are investigating the raid on Green's Hotel at Perth. The story told by the soldiers is that the hotel proprietor had refused all along to sell them food, cigars or beer, would not allow them to be served with meals in his dining room, or to buy food on the premises. An officer who recently visited Perth confirmed these facts yesterday. The report that any officers encouraged or winked at the raid is denounced in military circles as absurd. The officer in command at Perth, Major Young, is not the man to encourage or excuse violence by soldiers against civilians.

It was said in Perth that Green's refusal, ever since the soldiers came to Perth, to sell them food, has made bad blood. There has been talk about pro-German tendencies. Citizens of Perth say Green was away at the time of the attack and that his wife and employees, who were innocent parties in the trouble were badly frightened.

All sorts of stories are afloat since the trouble, and no doubt the investigation will get to the bottom of the whole matter, including the refusal of the hotel man to sell food to men in khaki.

Lieut.-Col. Fowler arrived in Sussex from Ottawa and while he would not confirm the rumor that his battalion was soon to go overseas he said that the 104th would be among the next ten thousand men to leave for the front.

Brig.-Gen. Hugh H. McLain and Col. A. H. H. Powell inspected Co. D. 104th Battalion Tuesday morning at Cornhill Park. The men were put through all the military tactics and their work was warmly commended by the inspecting officers.

Lance Corporal Trafford Donovan of the 104th, while playing ball at Fredericton, broke his right leg in two places.

Colonel George Fowler aims at having the 104th Battalion band, the finest among overseas units. Clarionets, cornets, oboes, bassoons, flutes and piccolos are needed to complete the organization.

Ernest Parsons and William Stewart of Woodstock have been officially reported wounded. Their names appeared in list published May 16.

Rev. and Hon. Captain H. E. Thomas, chaplain of the 55th Battalion, which left St. John for Sussex just a year ago before going to Valcartier was recently in St. John. As already stated, he has been ordered home owing to being unable to stand the physical strain of work on active service, and it is believed will resume his pastorate at West St. John. Captain Thomas has improved since his relief from active duty and since his stay in Woodstock. He speaks highly of the splendid way in which the 55th under Lieut. Colonel J. R. Kirkpatrick went through their drill in England. That drill is considered to be very severe far harder than anything done at Valcartier, but it makes men of the recruits. It is the kind that all English recruits go through.
