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WHAT HAS HAPPENED

Concise Outline of the Trend of Events That Have Transpired in the War Zone

The Australian and New Zealand troops which fought at Gallipoli are now in France.

The German steamship Telde, which had been interned at the Canary Islands, drifted seaward during a gale, and was captured by a cruiser.

One British aeroplane was captured by the Germans off the Flanders coast and another was shot down and the occupants killed.

The British Government, in response to the demand of the United States, has released German prisoners taken from an American ship on the high seas.

The British steamer Ruabon, 2,000 tons, has been sunk by a submarine, according to Lloyd's. The crew was picked up by the Italian steamer Misturata.

The White Star Liner Cymric, loaded with munitions, was torpedoed off the Irish coast, but an effort is being made to keep her afloat until port is reached.

The Westminster Gazette estimates the total of German losses to the middle of April at over 3,000,000 men, nearly equal to half the population of Canada.

Germany is finally convinced that the big Dutch liner Tubantia was torpedoed, instead of being sunk by a mine, and will replace it by a larger vessel from the Hamburg-American fleet.

At a meeting held in Tremont Temple, Boston, in memory of the victims of the Lusitania more than 2,500 persons voted that President Wilson should be urged to sever diplomatic relations with Germany immediately.

The British merchant ship Clan MacFarlan was attacked by two submarines in the Bay of Biscay. The Clan returned the fire and believes she sank one of the enemy. The Clan was damaged by gun fire but arrived at her home port in safety.

TWENTY YEARS AGO

Mrs. P. Gillin's row of tulips on each side of the entrance path to her residence presents a very pretty appearance. They showed the earliest bloom we have seen this spring.

The Knights of Pythias, Ivanhoe Lodge, No. 7, marshalled by Past Grand Chancellor W. B. Nicholson, marched in procession from their lodge room on King St. Sunday morning to the F. C. B. church, where Rev. C. T. Phillips preached an appropriate sermon.

There were some 33 Knights in procession and they presented a particularly neat and attractive appearance. The occasion was the observance of the 33rd anniversary of the establishment of the order. The date of this anniversary was really in February last, but owing to the inclemency of the weather the observance could not then be conveniently held.

On the night of the 3rd inst., when the greater number of the inhabitants of Grafton had retired to their beds, or with the thoughts of Sabbath services still dwelling in their minds, an alarm was given and a house near the mouth of the Newburg road was found to be in flames. It was a new building and by the industry of a poor man, Mr. Tompkins, sufficiently complete to be occupied, as was intended by his family on the following day. As there had been as yet no fire in the building it was evidently the work of some evil and designing person. We are informed that suspicions rest on a party and that further developments may lead to arrest of one or more persons. Should not a reward be offered for the apprehension and conviction of the guilty party and every effort made to bring to the light the perpetrators of such heinous acts?

Some excitement was created about 11.30 Wednesday night, by the discharge of heavy artillery, followed by the clanging of the fire bell. The alarm was sent 'in from D. Munro's house, and the firemen quickly responded, but only to find after some searching, enquiry and emphatic language, that there was no fire, but that the boys had taken this method of celebrating the marriage of a popular member of the fire company, Fred B. Hayden. A charivari, under the circumstances may have been the right thing, but its method is open to serious objections.
