J. ARTHUR F. GARDEN DIES SUDDENLY

Prominent in Business and Social Circles—A Worthy Citizen Whose Loss will be Felt

It is with deep regret that we announce the sudden death of Mr. J. Arthur F. Garden, which occurred at an early hour Tuesday morning.

The word of his passing created universal expressions of sorrow. While not in robust health it was never thought that his condition was serious, but he was seized with a sudden ill turn and in spite of medical attention and tender care he did not rally and passed peacefully away. The death of Mr. Garden removes from the community a man who stood prominently in the business life and development of the town and a citizen who was keenly interested in the welfare of the town and its people and who was highly esteemed and respected.

It also takes away an official of the Anglican Church, of which he was a devout member and regular attendant, who was conscientious in the performance of his duties and faithful to every obligation that devolved upon him. It bereft the town of a self-made man, who, by his energy, honesty and strict attention made a success of his business as a druggist.

His time, outside of business hours, was spent in his home and was devoted to his wife's happiness and comfort, and to whom, in her sudden bereavement, is extended the deepest sympathy of Woodstock townspeople.

Besides his wife, who was Miss Georgie Stevenson of St. Andrews, he is survived by three brothers and one sister.

MILITARY NOTES OF LOCAL INTEREST

Frank Skinner, formerly of the Bank of British North America, St. John, and at the time of his death on active service with the Canadian Divisional Signal Company, wrote to Mr. C. H. Ferguson of St. John, enclosing his will, saying he expected to go into action the next day. He did go into battle and was killed on May 5th last. His estate consists of entirely personal property, value \$1,422.60, including life insurance, fifty dollars was left to the London Homeopathic Hospital and the remainder to his father, William Radnell Skinner, of Westcliff, England.

The will was admitted to probate and is believed to be the first soldier's will ever admitted to probate in New Brunswick without proof of the execution.

A public reception, at Truro, was tendered Lance Corporal Elish R. Mills, formerly of Woodstock, who was invalided home from France. He lost one eye and received 26 wounds on his body. He will enter the Baptist ministry.

Word received from member of the 104th Overseas Battalion, under command of Lieut. Col. G. W. Fowler, M.P., is to the effect that the band of the battalion left England on Saturday last for Scotland on a ten days pass. It is also rumored that the 104th will do guard duty in the city of London during the coming winter. Percy Edgecombe, Joseph Donovan and W. J. Kelly, of Fredericton, are with the 104th Band.

Three hundred men from the 104th Battalion have been sent to France. This is the first draft to go over and it is expected others will soon follow. Forty from Co. "D" were in the draft. Both officers and men of this fine company were very popular during their stay in Woodstock and their movements will be watched with eager interest by all the citizens.

Woodstock New Brunswick

Pte. L. L. McArthur, of Canterbury, attached to the 115th Battalion, was among the soldiers who returned last week.

A man who had seen perhaps more fighting than any other of the party was a New Brunswicker who enlisted in Penticton (B.C.), with the 7th Battalion and went overseas with the first Canadian contingent. Among the things he did were: Enlisted as a private, earned his stripes until he was a sergeant—licked a sergeant-major in a fair fight—lost his stripes on that account. Went to France and won them back and is now home to take a commission in the 236th Kilties Battalion. He is Sergt. George F. P. Babin, of Edmundston, the son of Mrs. A. Babin of that place.

Another draft of seventy five men will be taken from the 65th Battery. It is said the draft will be ready about January 1st. Fifty recruits for this battery are reported coming from Campbellton and other North Shore towns.

The report last week that George Atherton had joined the 2nd Reserve Artillery, was not correct. This gallant young soldier expressed a wish to go back with his old comrades on his recovery and expects to be at the front again very soon.

Recruiting for the Divisional Ammunition Column has been authorized for the maritime provinces, with headquarters at Sackville, N. B. Lt. A. G. Gunn of the 19th Battery has been appointed section commander, with Lt. A. E. Andrew of the 20th Battery as assistant. The object is to provide drafts and reinforcements, and one section will be recruited in the maritime provinces. In addition to three officers, 168 men will be required for the section.

The 211th Battalion of Calgary arrived in St. John this week on the first stage of their journey to the front. Nearly all the officers and men of this Battalion are Americans.

Word has been received that Major J. J. Bull, has been sent to an hospital in London. He has been at the front for nine months and in several of the severe engagements on the Somme. It is thought that he is suffering from an attack of bronchitis as his last letter indicated trouble of this nature.
