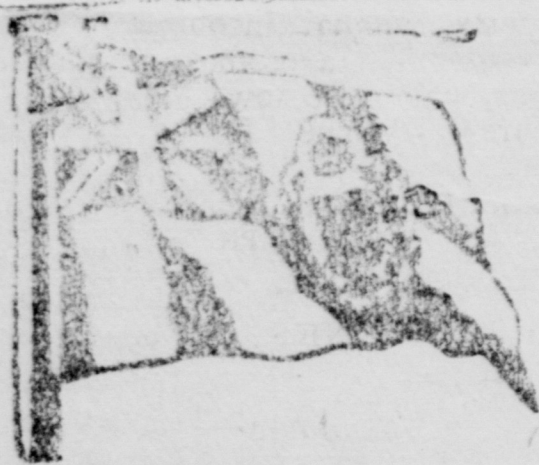

EXPENSIVE ROADS.

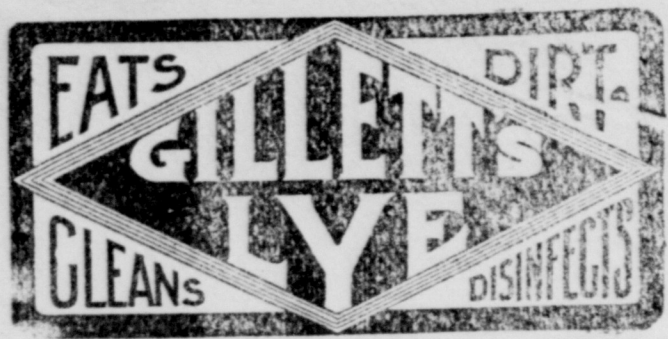
Unless some people have to go direct into their pocketbooks and pull out the cash they don't realize that they are paying for anything. This is about the proposition that confronts one when looking into the road question. But the present condition of affairs is making the farmer and the automobilist realize that the frightful state of the roads can be traced to the universally corrupt conditions that exist in every branch of the public service under the present rotten administration now clinging on at Fredericton. In the county of Carleton the roads, in some sections are almost impassable. From Jacksonville to Jackson town, one of the most wealthy districts in the province, not a blow was struck until last week, when a huge mass of mud and suds was dragged to the middle of the road and left there. The same conditions apply to the River Road below town which was "improved" on Saturday. It is an outrage that work of such great public importance should be left until July and then officials put on for political purposes. It is expensive politics to scrape mud out of the gutters and place it in the middle of the road where it becomes a menace to the travelling public. The principal features of the present government system in relation to roads are inspectors, commissioners, agents and a lot of other nonsense in which a gang of hoodlums pocket the money paid by the people for public needs.

It is about time that improvements should be made to help the travelling public and not the pockets of political accidents.

MR. CARVELL'S MEETINGS.

In reply to an alleged "special correspondent," who has been endeavoring to make it appear that Mr. Carvell's meetings in Carleton county were a "frost," the Hartland Observer says:

"Dark Lantern Brigadier and His Miserable Methods," and "Some Straight Truths" are the choice scare headlines the St. John Standard inscribes over a calumnious article sent to it by a "special" Hartland correspondent. "A Decided Frost" is what the Standard deducts is the result of F. B. Carvell's recent meetings at Hartland and Centreville. Outside of the zones from which Mr. Carvell drew his audience, and outside of Carleton county, the Standard's allegation of a "frost" might go down with some of its hide bound readers. The people of this county know Mr. Carvell was splendidly received, and the fact that many Tories went to hear him and that none are finding fault with what he said, is indeed significant. Whatever the Standard's "special" brand of correspondent may have said against Mr. Carvell may have been expected. Could he have concocted anything more defamatory he would have done so had he a solitary personal bolt to shoot against Mr. Carvell, or he would have let it fly. His article



shows the trace of a snake in the grass—a snake who has beaten down the grass and is no longer concealed.

The man of all men who should help recruiting is the Minister of Militia. A Minister of the Crown who grants commissions to Germans and to stranded relatives does not inspire confidence in the administration of his department and does not inspire popular eagerness to join the colors. Sir Sam has carried things with a high hand, he has characterized the evidence of wrong doing, in connection with munitions manipulation, as "piffle." But he can't dismiss serious matters as "piffle." His own party finds express themselves as heartily sick of the "wild man's" behaviour and flagrant disregard of the decencies of responsible administration. If these things cannot be swallowed by the most hide-bound partisans, can it be expected they will evoke enthusiasm for recruiting?

Mayor Sutton, at Friday night's meeting of the Council, referred to the bonds printed by the Sentinel and thought the bill was high. Without questioning the motive of his worship in referring to this bill from among many others, it would have been of interest if he had told the board the source of his information as to the charge for this work and perhaps more light would have been shed on the subject.

PARCELS TO SOLDIERS

Parcels can be sent by parcel post at the following rates:

To Valcartier—Ten cents for first pound and six cents for each additional pound, limit eleven pounds.

To England—Twelve cents a pound, up to a limit of eleven pounds.

To France—Twenty four cents for first three pounds, thirty two cents for from three to seven pounds.

Parcels should be done up securely, preferably in tin boxes, wrapped with cotton cloth and addressed in indelible ink.

For additional safety they may be registered.
