WHAT HAS HAPPENED

Concise Outline of the Trend of Events That Have Transpired in the War Zone

Enemy aviators last week bombed positions on the Suez Canal. The British force attempting to relieve the garrison at Kut el Mara met with another repulse last week. Three Zepps bombed the eastern coast of Britain Monday night.

From February 21st to the middle of April, the Germans claim to have captured 711 French officers and 38,155 men in the fighting around Verdun.

Sir Charles Nicholson, the father of the late Capt. C. N. G. Nicholson,

is the nineteenth member of the House of Commons to lose a son in the war.

Prince Regent Alexander of Serbia says that Serbia has lost nearly one-fifth of its total population since the war began, and that the remaining four millions are faced with starvation unless Serbia can be restored to her own government.

British soldiers are to be armed with a helmet made of the hardest steel. It is perfectly smooth, having no flutings or projections for bullets or fragments of shrapnel to strike against, while its low pitch presents the smallest possible target for a direct hit from any direction.

Private William Lonsdale, the British soldier who was first sentenced to death and then to twenty years' imprisonment for striking a German guard in a prison camp, writes to his wife in Sheffield that he has been officially informed that he will be released at the end of the war for good conduct.

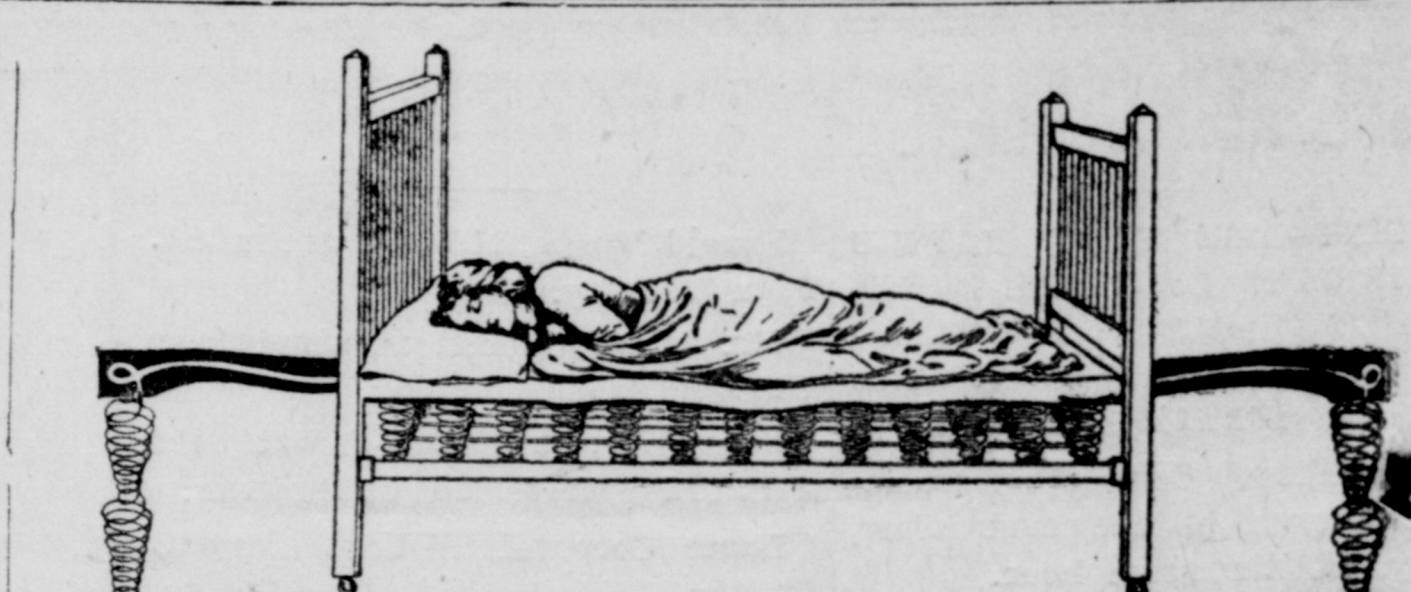

The liquor interests in the City of St. John were led to believe that such was the case and two young lawyers in the city of St. John, John A. Barry and G. Earle Logan, the former an intimate friend and supporter of the Attorney General, and Mr. Logan, the generally accepted law partner of the same member of the government, were picked out to represent the brewers, wholesalers and retailers in Fredericton, while the Legislature was in session or while the liquor bill was under consideration. I want to point out to you when I say that Mr. Logan was a law partner of the Attorney General that I make the assertion upon the authority of their names being publicly advertised in the city directory, in the telephone book and upon court records as Baxter & Logan. I know that the people generally accepted them as legal partners but I know nothing of any office arrangement they might have had. At any rate, Mr. Logan and Mr. Barry came to Fredericton to represent the liquor dealers and they came well provided with funds. I have it on the authority of retailers, wholesalers, hotel men and others who knew that contributions ranging from \$50 to \$800 were paid to the fund for these young lawyers. I know that W. B. Tennant, who is well known in St. John as an ardent supporter of the Attorney General's, and is one of his political organizers, and who is interested with him in several important transactions, I know that this same Mr. Tennant sent a

hurried message to the president of Ready's Brewery, stating that if he did not get \$500 that evening that prohibition would pass in Fredericton before morning. I know and would have proved that this money was paid in accordance with the demand. I know and would have proved that a further sum of \$300 was demanded from this same concern and was paid. I know that Mr. Richard Sullivan and Mr. Thomas Haley made certain collections from whole salers and retailers and I also know that the sum realized was in the vicinity of at least \$6000.

In confirmation of this, only a few days ago Mr. Richard Sullivan himself told a member of this government, who informed me, that between \$5000 and \$6000 had been paid over by the liquor interests during the last session for these two lawyers, and that afterwards a further demand was made upon the liquor people and was refused.

Can you wonder, Mr. Dugal, that with all these facts in my possession and many more that I do not care to bring into this matter at the present time, can you wonder that I asked Royal Commissioner Chandler to investigate such an important matter?

Had that investigation been given by Mr. Chandler, I was ready and prepared to make the charges and to prove them. Had my libel suit against The Standard been permitted to come to trial I was ready to prove that every word that I spoke to Mr. Chandler was the truth. I did not say then, nor do I say now, that any member of the Legislature was corrupted or influenced by means of this money but I ask you and I ask the public to judge why such large sums were necessary to pay the legal expenses of two young lawyers just starting out in their profession. I ask the public to study the connection between Mr. Logan and the Attorney General, between the Attorney General and Mr. Tennant and between the Attorney General and his former clients, the liquor dealers, and let the people decide whether in their judgment, it was possible for all of these transactions to have been carried out under cover and without the knowledge of a man so thoroughly acquainted with every one concerned as the Hon. J. B. M. Baxter.

My suit against The St. John Standard was thrown out of court on a legal technicality and perhaps because of one fact it is just as well that it was thrown out. Before the suit was brought to trial I asked for a special jury to hear the evidence, and I want to tell you how I was treated. Please bear in mind that this was a political case, that I, as the organizer of the opposition party was suing The Standard, the organ of the Conservative and government party; it was therefore advisable, in the interests of justice, yes, it was almost imperative in the interests of justice, that the special jury asked for should be composed of men who had no interest in politics, who had no regard for either E. S. Carter or for The St. John Standard.

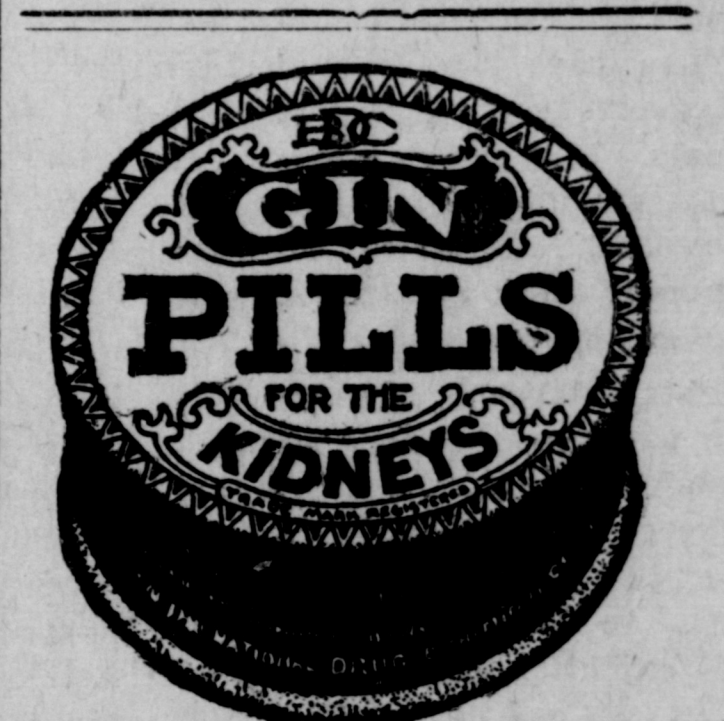
The man who had the choosing of the special jury under the law, was County Secretary Kelly, the close friend of the Hon. Attorney General, and when Mr. Kelly handed over the names of that special jury, of whom do you think it was composed in part? There were seven ward chairmen of the Conservative party, there were three stockholders of The Standard newspaper, there were three liquor dealers, there was a brother-in-law of Mr. W. B. Tennant there were office seekers and officials of Conservative organizations on that jury list; there were also five or six Liberals, including T. H. Estabrooks, Arthur W. Adams, David J. Brown, Peter Campbell, John Flood.

Hon. Mr. Baxter was the legal representative of The Standard newspaper. I do not dispute the fact that it was a wise choice for The Standard, for undoubtedly, Mr. Baxter knew more about the case than anyone else. In striking the jury before the county secretary, he eliminated the names I have mentioned above, and of course my lawyer struck out the seven ward chairmen, and of the balance we had some stockholders of The Standard, some liquor dealers, office seekers and prominent Conservatives to pick a jury of seven from.

Do you wonder that I say it was rather a fortunate thing that the suit did not come to trial. I am glad to have this opportunity of writing you. I have to thank the Attorney General for giving me such a chance to expose this matter on the floors of the Legislature and I hope you will see it to use it when you speak in the House.
