RESENT THE SLURS OF TORIES

Aspersions On The Loyalty of Liberals by Cheap Politicians

INSULT TO MEN IN THE TRENCHES

Fine Gathering of Eastern Ontario Stalwarts at Ottawa—Hon. W. S. Fielding Says Liberals Must Organize So Long as the Government Threatens Election

OTTAWA, Nov. 16—An enthusiastic, largely attended and representative gathering of the Liberals of Eastern Ontario met in Ottawa today to discuss in a free-for-all council problems of national politics, to voice and to hear suggestions as to the principles for which the Liberal Party stands and to advise as to the best methods of furthering organization and concerted effort for securing the triumph of Liberal principles in the conduct of Government.

The gathering is the first of a series of district Liberal conferences planned for the whole Do-

minion. Some four hundred delegates assembled in St. Patrick's Hall from the Counties of Leeds, Grenville, Stormont, Glengarry, Carleton, Lanark, Renfrew, Dundas, Russell, Prescott and the City of Ottawa.

The conference was opened by Mr. D. B. Rochester, President of the Ottawa Liberal Association, Hon. George P. Graham and Mr. M. Racine, M.P.P. for Russell, acted as Chairmen. The keynote of the conference was struck by Hon. W. S. Fielding.

LIBERALS MUST ORGANIZE.

Liberals, he declared, had been asked by Conservatives to observe silence on matters of political controversy as long as the war lasted. But all the time, declared the ex-Minister of Finance, the Liberals were hanging under the threat of general election which might come at any moment. With the expression on the part of the Government that the Liberals should maintain silence, should have come also the clear cut assurance that no general election would be precipitated. "There must be an election some day," he declared, "perhaps not this year and perhaps not next; but Liberals must be organized. The work you are doing today is necessary work so long as the Government keeps the shadow hanging over you."

At the close of the afternoon session the following resolution was unanimously adopted.

"That this convention of representative Liberals of Eastern Ontario, takes this earliest opportunity of placing upon record its unswerving loyalty to the King and Empire; pledges assistance to every effort making for the vigorous prosecution of the war to ultimate success; and at the same time, records resentment at the reported remarks of certain Conservative politicians impugning the loyalty of the great Liberal party; which remarks are considered as entirely unjustified and an insult to the thousands of true Liberals who, today, mourn sons and brothers, who have given their lives at the front as proof of their loyalty and devotion to the British Empire."

RESENT TORY SLURS.

The discussion which led up to the adoption of the resolution was characterized by strongly expressed resentment against the recent utterances of Conservative politicians, like Messrs. McNaught and McBride of Toronto, who had intimated that the Conservative Party was doing all of the fighting in the present war. Man after man, with one or more sons at the front or killed in action rose to voice in no uncertain language anger and resentment at the aspersions of cheap Tory politicians on the Liberal leaders and the Liberal Party. Coupled with these expressions there was much plainly expressed criticisms of the present Government's administration of Canada's part in the war, in the course of which there were frequent references to the recent sensational correspondence between Sir Robert Borden and his late Minister of Militia.

WE ASK NO QUARTER.

"To talk of disloyalty against the Liberal party," said Hon. George P. Graham, "is out of place. We have candidates in the various ridings of Ontario who are going to the front; we have candidates who are at the front; we have candidates who have been at the front, and have returned. We ask no quarter on the loyalty question."

SIR SAM HUGHES NO WORSE THAN HIS GOVERNMENT

F. B. Carvell, M. P., Says Whole Scheme Was to Make Political Capital Out of War

AND MINISTER CAME MOST IN LIMELIGHT

As Exponent of High Tariff A. E. Kemp is Most Likely to Get Vacant Portfolio—Some Reasons Why High Cost of Living Problem Will Not Be Touched.

(Daily Telegraph.) That the resignation of Sir Sam Hughes, minister of militia was the result of a combination of difficulties in which the present government found itself, was the analysis placed on the present political situation at Ottawa by F. B. Carvell, M. P., who was interviewed last night by The Telegraph.

"I don't think that Sir Sam is any worse than his government," he said. "There is no way for the government to get rid of the unpleasant fact that the scheme of the Conservative party from the beginning of the war was to make political capital out of it, so far as possible. Every person who sold goods had to sell through the middleman and so be run through the political machine."

"Sir Sam only happened to be the man in the line-light," he continued. "When we started after the militia department they voted everything down by brute force, but it reached a point in the end when public sentiment became so strong that something had to be done and the government picked out this militia council scheme in London as a sort of way out of it."

NEW BRUNSWICK THE WORST. "While Sir Sam played his own game in the war every politician in Canada was playing the game too, for all he was worth except on a smaller scale, and in no place in Canada has it been played so viciously as in the province of New Brunswick."

Asked as to who he thought would likely fill Sir Sam's shoes, Mr. Carvell said that he believed A. E. Kemp was the man who would probably be given the position. He expressed the opinion that Mr. Kemp would make a bid for the appointment, and in all probability land it.

"This is a government of the big interests," he added by way of explanation, "and the man who has lots of money and belongs to the money aristocracy is the man who Borben wants with him. It is the high tariff wing of the government that sways it, and that is the reason I believe that Kemp will get the appointment as minister of militia."

Asked if he thought the government would take any action in the matter of the high cost of living, Mr. Carvell replied: "The appointment of a commission to investigate would, from the experience of the past few months with commissions, show as plainly that the government does not mean business."

COMING CLOSE HOME.

"Supposing the government did take action in the matter, where would it land them?" he continued. "For instance, the price of canned goods is today one of the things which is an important factor in the

high cost of living. Let us see. One of the first men the government would have to get after would be A. E. Kemp, who furnishes the metal to make about two-thirds of the tin cans used in Canada. So they would strike him first."

"Then there is Francis R. Lalor, member for Haldimand (Ont.), and David Marshall, who represents East Elgin (Ont.), two men who are leading spirits of the Canadian canners. So what would be the use, in the face of these facts, having an investigation into the high cost of living by this government?"

Mr. Carvell expressed the opinion that the high price of flour and bread in America today was the direct result of combinations on both sides of the boundary line. This was proven by the fact that bread is selling today in England cheaper than in either Canada or the United States. He held that there was certainly good ground for an investigation into the matter.

Regarding the usefulness of commissions under the present government, he said: "The best value of all these commissions is found in the reply of Sir Sam Hughes to the premier, when he says they look fine on paper but never accomplish anything."

THE DEUTSCHLAND SCURRIES BACK TO NEW LONDON

German Submarine, After Proceeding to Sea, Turn so Suddenly as to Ram one of the Tugs Conveying Her and Sank it, Costing the Lives of Seven Sailors—German Officers Refuse to Tell What Frightened Them

New London, November 17.—Seven members of the crew of one of the tugs which accompanied the German submarine Deutschland from New London early to-day on her return trip to Bremen, were drowned when the submersible and the tug collided in the race, about twelve miles from this port. The only person on the tug saved was Capt. Fred Hirsch, of the werman interned liner Neckar. The tug, which belonged to the T. A. Scott Wrecking Company, went to the bottom.

The Deutschland returned to her dock here at 5.15 a.m. Officials declined to discuss the accident or to tell the extent of the damage inflicted on the submarine.

The tug and the submarine came together in a relatively smooth sea. When it was apparent that the tug was fatally rammed the crew jumped overboard. Captain Hirsch swam to a life preserver thrown out by the Deutschland's crew.

The Deutschland drew out of her pocket at the pier of the Eastern Forwarding Co., at 1.30 o'clock this morning, accompanied by the tugs T. A. Scott and the Alert of the T. A. Scott Wrecking Company, sub-agents of the Eastern Forwarding Company. She carried on her homeward dash a cargo valued at \$2,000,000 and consisting of nickel, rubber and silver bars. The trip down the harbor was without incident and when last seen by a newspaper launch the submersible was plunging through a smooth sea at the rate of twelve knots an hour, headed for Montauk Point. The newspaper launch returned here after following the submarine several miles. At that time the sea was smooth and the moon in its last quarter cast its rays over the water. schland's crew in their oilskins were on deck. Greetings shouted at them by passing craft were not returned. Failure of the tugs to return at an early hour led to much speculation as it was not believed that they would accompany the submersible beyond the three-mile limit.

The tug sunk by the Deutschland was the T. A. Scott, Jr. The list of dead includes: Captain John Gurney, Engineer William A. Caton, Fireman Edward Stok, Cook Clarence B. Davison, Deck Hand Eugene Duzant.

Captain Koenig appeared pale and shaken as he stepped ashore from his vessel on its return. He refused to talk about the collision and immediately sent word to Vice-President Hilken of the Eastern Forwarding Company, who arrived at the company's offices shortly afterwards and went into consultation with him.

"The accident happened all in a minute," according to a member of the Deutschland's crew, who talked briefly about it this morning. The tug, he said, got in front of the submarine, and the Deutschland struck it in the stern, lifting it so far out of the water that the tug went under. An explosion of the boiler of the tug followed immediately.

ALL SHIPS WILL CARRY TROOPS

Wives and Relatives of Canadian Soldiers in England Will Have Difficulty in Securing Transportation After War

OTTAWA, Nov. 9.—A memorandum issued from the Prime Minister's office today calls attention to the fact that all women or other members of family of Canadian soldiers who have gone to England to live or who contemplate going there, should seriously consider the difficulties which are sure to arise at the end of the war in regard to securing transportation home again. It is pointed out that most of the space in all available transatlantic steamers will be needed to bring the troops themselves back to Canada. There will be little if any space available for women or children, and consequently they may find themselves stranded in England for an indefinite period.

Of the 500,000 men promised by Canada, only 100,000 of them are at the front. Although they were promised almost a year ago, over 130,000 are yet to be got, and they are not even in sight.

All sorts of extravagance, graft and expensive patronage have run riot. The ordinary expenses of the Government have been doubled, and Canada's share of the war has been carried on in the most extravagant manner.

Thousands of dollars' worth of war material sent from Canada to Britain have been scrapped or thrown aside as useless. Military equipment of all kinds have been sent to the scrap heap. Transport wagons and bicycles found to be
