

Soldiers in England Will Have Difficulty in Securing Transportation After War

OTTAWA, Nov. 9-A memorandum ssued from the Prime Minister's office today calls attention to the fact that all women or other members of family of Canadian soldiers who have gone to England to live or who contemplate going there, should serious ly consider the difficulties which are sure to arise at the end of the war in regard to securing transportation home again. It is pointed out that most of the space in all available transatlantic steamers will be meeded to bring the troops themselves back to Canada. There will be little if any space available for

women or children, and consequently they may find themselves stranded n England for an indefinite period.




