## MILITARY NOTES OF LOCAL INTEREST

The peculiar fact has come to light that recruiting in Ireland has fallen off in all parts of the country in equal volume. The Protestant and Unionist parts of the country are, if anything, slumped rather more decidedly than the Catholic and Home Rule parts. Belfast, and indeed the whole loyalist province of Ulster, have almost ceased to send men into the army.

Lance Corp. Chauncey D. Orchard, brother of Rev. Frank Orchard of Woodstock, has been awarded a Military Cross for bravery.

H. Chesworth of Simonds, N. B., appears in the list of wounded this week.

Jack Chandler who was wounded while fighting with the 26th, and has been in an English hospital, has recovered and writes: "I am ready for the front again." He has been transferred to the First Reserve.

George Atherton, who was badly wounded some months ago, has about recovered and is now attached to the Second Reserve Artillery.

A Woodstock boy writing from "Somewhere in France" under date of Nov. 16th, says: "I was talking to young 'Teddy' Greer the other day. He is attached to the Royal Engineers now and is looking fine. I also saw Bob Campbell, who is in the 5th Brigade Machine Gun. He had an exciting time a month ago but got through all right. I passed on the road, a few days ago, an Everett boy from Woodstock. He is in the 18th Battalion."
