A grant of \$300 given to Rev. H. E. Thomas by the Methodist Conference to cover the expenses of furnishing a home for his wife and family during the year he was in active service, has been returned to the conference. In returning the money, Mr. Thomas expressed his appreciation of the thoughtfulness which prompted the grant.

Mrs. Albert Nevers died in the hospital at Houlton, of pneumonia, Dec. 9th. She leaves one brother, John, who lives in Connell, Carleton County, and a large circle of friends to mourn their sad loss. The remains were brought to Simonds for burial, where the services were conducted by Rev. G. A. Gilchrist.

The names of Rev. W. R. Robinson, Mr. Edwin W. Stockford and Mr. John B. Jones, all of St. John, are mentioned as possibilities for the office of provincial prohibition inspector. The duties of the office will begin on May 1st, but the appointment will be made before that date, probably at the January session of the Provincial Government. It is said the salary will be \$2,000 per year.
