## TWO WOODSTOCK SOLDIERS REPORTED KILLED

George McCluskey of the C. P. R., received an official communication Tuesday, that his son, Clarence Mc-



Cluskey, had been killed in action while fighting in defence of the Empire. He left Canada with the 23rd Battery from Fredericton, and was recently transferred to the Canadian Highlanders, and has seen much active service, being twice wounded. The young soldier was only 20 years of age but had the right spirit and in his passing the bereaved relatives have the satisfaction of knowing that he died the death of a brave young soldier. He is survived by his parents, one brother, Dexter, and one sister, Mrs. Wm. Veasey.

C. D. Johnson received word from Ottawa, Wednesday, that his brother, James Johnson, had been officially reported "Killed in action." He was with the 26th Battalion, was about 50 years of age, and was well known in this section of New Brunswick. The relatives will have the sympathy of the community in their grief for this hero who gave up his life for his country.

## REV. ALFRED E. LEPAGE.

The Rev. Alfred E. LePage, one of the oldest ministers of the Methodist denomination, who has been on the supernumerary list for a number of years, died suddenly Monday morning at the home of his son-in-law, Rev. Gordon Pringle, at Kincardine, Victoria Co. Mr. LePage was in his usual health when he left here Saturday. He was 74 years of age, a native of Charlottetown, P. E. I., and was fifty-one years in the ministry. Only a short time ago Rev. Mr. LePage contributed \$500.00 to help clear off the debt on the Woodstock church, and it is said gave liberally of his supernumerary allowance to charities. Besides a widow he is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Nelson LePage, Vancouver, and two sons, John T. of St. Boniface, Man., and Alfred W. of Jamaica Plain, Mass.; there is one sister, Mrs. John Dorey, of Charlottetown, P. E. I. The funeral will take place on Friday.

At a special meeting of the Evangelical Alliance of Moncton, Rev. W. B. Wiggins, who is to remove to Woodstock, placed his resignation as secretary-treasurer before the meeting and it was accepted. Each of the members present expressed regrets at the removal of Mr. Wiggins from the city and spoke in the highest terms of his work there. He was very highly commended for the faithfulness with which he filled the position of secretary-treasurer of the alliance for the last eight years, and it was felt by each one present that the city was losing a man, fearless in his denunciation of wrong and unwavering in his fidelity to the cause of right. Mr. Wiggins briefly thanked the members of the alliance for their kind expressions, and assured the alliance that his fellowship with his brother pastors of the city would long be remembered by him.

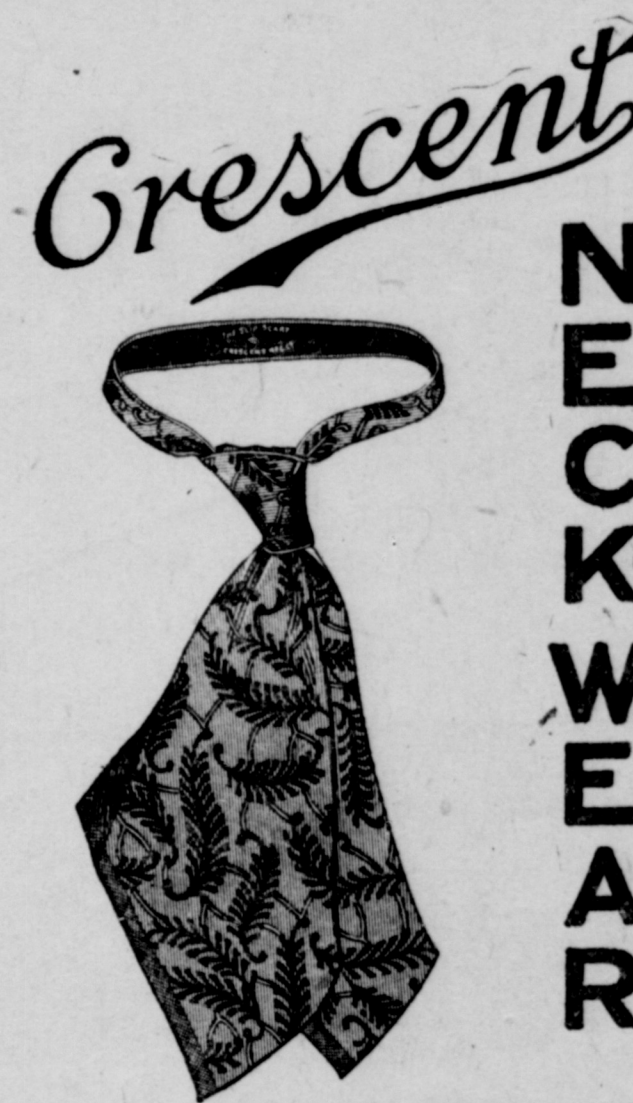
