PROHIBITION BILL

(Continued from last issue)

shall prevent a sick person from hav ing in his possession the liquor prescribed for him by a physician under section 46 of this act.

42. Nothing in section 5 herect contained shall apply to sales quantities of not less than two gallons at any time under legal process, judical sales, or sales under distress for rent, or to auctioneers selling on behalf of an assignee, any liquors neluded in any assignment of property for the general benefit creditors made by a person duly licensed under this act, or on behalf the estate of any deceased person, duly licensed at the time of death, during the term of such license, and nothing in this act con tained shall prevent common carriers or other persons from carrying or conveying liquor from a place outside of the province to a place where the same may be lawfully received and lawfully kept within the province, or from a place where it may

be lawfully delivered outside province, or from a place such liquor may be lawfully and lawfully delivered within province where the same may lawfully kept, or through the province from a place outside of it to a place outside of it.

Nothing herein, contained shall prevent any person from having siquor for export sale in his liquor varehouse, provided such liquor warehouse and the business carried on therein complies with the quirements in sub-section (I) hereof mentioned, or from selling from such liquor warehouse to persons in other provinces where such may be lawfully made, or in foreign countries, or to a wholesale liceasee un-

der this act. (I) The liquor warehouse in this section mentioned shall be suitable for the said business and shall be so constructed and equipped not to facilitate any violation of this act, and not connected by any internal way communication with any other building or any other portion of the same building, and shall be a wareroom on building wherein no other commodity or goods than liquor for export from the province are kept or sold to such wholesale licensee, and where in no other business than keeping or selling liquor for export from

the province is carried on. 46. Any physician who is lawfully and regulatly engaged in the practice of his profession, and who shall deem anyliquors necessary for the health of his patient or patients may give such patients or patients a written or printed prescription or prescription therefor in form No 12 in appendix to this act, or he may administer the liquor himself, for which purpose he may, when visiting in the discharge of his professional duties, have liquor in his possessicm not exceeding in quantity two quarts at any one time. 47. 
