FATTENING WHILE NATION'S BLOOD SPILLS FREELY

Mr. D. D. McKenna replying to the bustling Minister of Militia, who repeatedly stated he had no knowledge of discrimination in awarding contracts, made Sir Sam Squire and wiggle in real woman-like fashion. The following is an extract from Mr. McKenna's speech.

I have no fault to find with the ordinary patronage practice. If there is a big contract which the statute requires to go out to tender in the ordinary condition of things, I insist that it should go out to tender. Under the ordinary conditions which prevailed before the war, if there were cases in which the interests of the country could be fairly well protected by the discretion of officers, and they gave the preference to the friends of the Government, I have no fault to find. But that was when they were spending the ordinary revenue along ordinary lines. That was the practice when I was in the House supporting the Government. When I had the patronage in the country which I represent I had no fault to find with it, and I am not hypocritical enough to find fault with the Conservative party for doing what we did ourselves. But I do find fault with the practice, that exists today when conditions are entirely different. There was no war in our time. Today we are asking every man in this country to pay money towards carrying on the war; we tax him heavily for the purposes of the war.

They go to him for contributions to the Patriotic and other funds and the money is expended by the ministers of a Tory Government, or by their officials. THERE IS NO PARTY LINE DRAWN IN THE COLLECTING OF THE MONEY, THEY COLLECT FROM GRIT AND TORY ALIKE, BUT THE GRIT BOYS ARE JUST AS ABLE AND PATRIOTIC AND COURAGEOUS IN THE TRENCHES AS THE TORIES.
