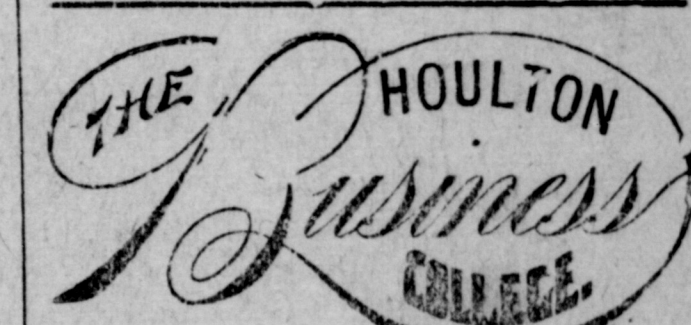

Telscombe, Sussex, Eng.

Dear Sister—I have been so frightfully busy of late travelling around the country visiting the other portions of my company, that I haven't had time to write for some time. However I am quite well but am trying to look after myself as the wet season has set in here in earnest, and it is awfully damp and cold. On Saturday the 20th I go before another medical board in London and will probably be given a further period of "home service" or be sent home. To give you an ex-

ample of my travels the last week or so, might say that on Tuesday last I motored to Lewis, there took train to London. Left London for Bromley in Kent, then motored 7 miles along the beautiful Kent roads to the Aerodrome. After my business finished, I went back over the same route and was in camp late the same night. While up there I was in the pretty little town of Westerham, where Gen. Wolf was born and brought up. The fine old house still stands and is a sort of residential museum.

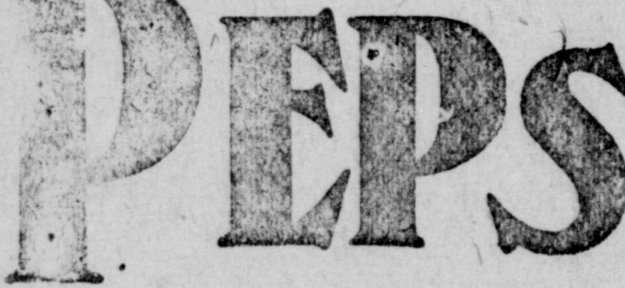
On Wednesday I started out in my Ford car and ran into Brighton (7 miles) then turned about and made east towards Folkestone, a distance of 100 miles or so (look at map). I arrived there about 4 p.m. It was a nice sunny day and a fine trip along the coast. I returned the next day. I wish you could make a trip like this in England. Along splen-

did tree-lined roads all asphalt and smooth, past endless great fields with old men, boys and German prisoners gathering in the crops, here an old village with ivy covered church and houses, there quite a large town with its old castle perched on some high crag nearby. We halted outside the walls of an old castle "Pevensey" and had lunch in an old inn. I took 20 minutes and went through an old house where I lived once upon a time. Andrew Borde, who was the court physician to King Henry VIII. I will send when I get time to pack them a lot of cards and booklets about these places. I passed over the famous Romney Marshes and through Rye with its famous old castle, past Battle Ashby where the battle of Hastings was fought, (Lord Ashburnham's place) then through Bexhill, St. Leonards, Hastings, Hythe, then on to Folkestone. I came back much the same route. The country all along looks much the same as the Moors Interval does and beautifully green. I spoke of German prisoners, you see them working everywhere now, threshing and pulling mangels, beets and turnips, etc. They work well and an elderly soldier guards about six with a loaded rifle on his back. I never saw such carrots and beets, etc., as they grow here. The soil and climate seems to suit them.

On Tuesday of this week I had to go to Southampton to my headquarters by way of Portsmouth. I got there about 8 p.m., then went to a theatre and sat next a number of American officers. They were from Boston, Mass. They all seem keen to get at the Germans. They will get plenty of opportunity before we are done.

We have had awful weather here lately and it has delayed our work very much. We are hoping to finish in a week or so then to move some where else. Tell Rhoda I hope to
