

## MILITARY NOTES

In a recent casualty list the name of J. Hinton, East Florenceville, appears among the killed.

Postmaster Winslow received a telegram Friday evening that his son, Lieut. Douglas Winslow had been slightly wounded Nov. 25th. The message was sent by the wounded soldier and was followed the next day with the official notification. It is hoped that the wounds are not serious, as the message would indicate, but further details are of course looked for with natural anxiety.

Private E. Booker, of Bristol, Carleton county, was among those who returned recently. In March of 1916 he enlisted with the 140th and on reaching France was transferred. At midnight on June 9 he accompanied a raiding party over to the enemy's trenches. There had been some trouble with a system of dug-outs, and it was thought advisable to bomb them out. Their position was ascertained and at midnight the party set out. Arriving within twenty feet of their trenches, unseen and unexpected by the occasional flare rockets, they crouched ready for the word. At a given signal the bombs were hurled into the darkness and all beat a hurried retreat. The enemy lines immediately awakened to activity and the bullets began whizzing overhead, but the men in the dug-out positions and the very positions themselves had been wiped out of existence. Unfortunately, while the raid was in progress, a shrapnel shell which the enemy had sent overhead at random, burst immediately over Private Booker's head and he was struck in the left side and wrist. After some time in hospital he was sent back to Canada.


## JAMES PORTER WITHDRAWS FROM FEDERAL CONTEST

Returning Officer Declares Hon Frank B. Carvell Elected—Public Opinion and Legal Technicalities Influence Retiring Candidate—A Letter.

Mr. James Porter came to town, Monday, and after several consultations with his friends, decided that he would withdraw from the federal contest. The pronounced public opinion against opposing the Union candidate, as well as defects in nomination paper were the chief reasons for Mr. Porter's action. Returning officer Foster with his election clerk, T. C. L. Ketchum and with sixes met at the court house and after receiving Mr. Porter's withdrawal declaration and convention after convention of Liberals have pulled and persuaded me to withdraw for the best interests of the Liberal party.

I still persisted until I am up against the fact, on the best legal authority, that my nomination is defective.

My nomination paper was prepared at Grand Falls, and when I brought it to Woodstock I consulted a solicitor, who advised me that it was not in proper form. He prepared

ed Hon. F. B. Carvell elected.

The following letter accompanied the withdrawal:

Albion R. Foster, Esq.,

Returning Officer, Carleton and Victoria,

Dear Sir:

In handing you my withdrawal as a candidate in the pending election, I desire to explain briefly my reasons for so doing.

As a strong supporter of Sir Wilfrid, I was very anxious to have a straight Liberal candidate nominated, and urged several prominent Liberals to run. It was only when they would not consent to run, that I accepted the candidature.

The Conservative party in Convention decided not to put up a contest.

another, but we had no time in which to get the signatures. It was filed subject to objection.

Since nomination day I had a friend get an opinion from another prominent solicitor and he advised that it was defective and irregular and pointed out in detail the reasons for his opinion. I concluded the nomination paper was insufficient and it would be useless to continue a contest which would only end in protest and defeat. For these reasons I decided to withdraw and save my friends from further trouble. I very much regret to do this, as my friends are many and true, and I shall never be able to compensate them for their kindness to me and loyalty to Sir Wilfrid.
