





PROHIBITION ACT SOON IN FCRCE IN CARLETON COUNTY

The New Brunswick Prohibition Act becomes operative in Carleton at 1 o'clock a. m., Dec. 4th.

No such 1 quors may be delivered to of this Act. Consignee cannot carry pure blood. his liquors from freight or express delivered by said common carrier

and receipted for in person and on such premises. Any place other than a "private dwelling" is subject to search at any time without a warrant; a private dwelling may be searched on a war rant and on one conviction of tenant ceases to be a private dwelling and is subject to search without a warrant at any time. A conviction of a tenant is de facto a conviction of the owner of such premises. No one may have or sell, give or barter etc. liquor except under a license provided by the law, in any place other than in a private dwelling and there only for his personal use. The finding of such prohibited liquor is prima facie evidence that it was kept

Any person intoxicated is subject to arrest, to be taken before any magistrate and an affidavit be required from him stating where and drawn. from whom liquor was obtained, failure to do so shall subject him to imprisonment.


