The Customs officers desire again to call the attention of the travelling public to the regulations governing International traffic by Highway.

All persons crossing the frontier, whether by team, carriage, automobile or on foot, are required to report to the officer nearest to the line before going out, and likewise to report to the same officer on the return trip giving the description, quantity and value of the goods in their possession, the contents of their vehicles, etc. The eport to this officer is required even though no goods be brought in.

Importations of goods from U.S. A. may not be made except between sunrise

The neglect of these regulations subject the traveller to seizure of goods and the conveyance in which they are carried and also a heavy fine.
