The Customs officers desire again to call the attention of the travelling public to the regulations governing International traffic by Highway.

All persons crossing the frontier, whether by team, carriage, automobile or on foot, are required to report to the officer nearest to the line before going out, and likewise to report to the same officer on the return trip giving the description, quantity and value of the goods in their possession, the contents of their vehicles, etc. The report to this officer is required even though no goods be brought in.

Importations of goods from U. S. A. may not be made except between sunrise and sunset.

The neglect of these regulations subject the traveller to seizure of goods and the conveyance in which they are carried and also a heavy fine.

Mr. F. B. Carvell, M.P., arrived from Ottawa yesterday and in the afternoon paid a visit to the Legislative Assembly, where he received a very hearty greeting from the Government supporters. Mr. Carvell as usual has been very busy with his parliamentary duties, but he hopes to be able to find time to assist in the coming probe of Valley Railway matters.

MILITARY NOTES OF LOCAL INTEREST

Earnest Finnamore, Earnest Rimes, Miles Moore, Orville Troy and Simon Ryan, who have enlisted in the Forestry Company, left here Monday morning for Sussex to get their uniforms and equipment. This unit is expected to go overseas at an early date.

The 65th Battery will leave here for Petawawa Sunday evening at 7.35 o'clock. After a period of training there they will go overseas. The young men of this organization here became very popular with the citizens generally and every good wish will follow them in the noble work in which they are engaged.

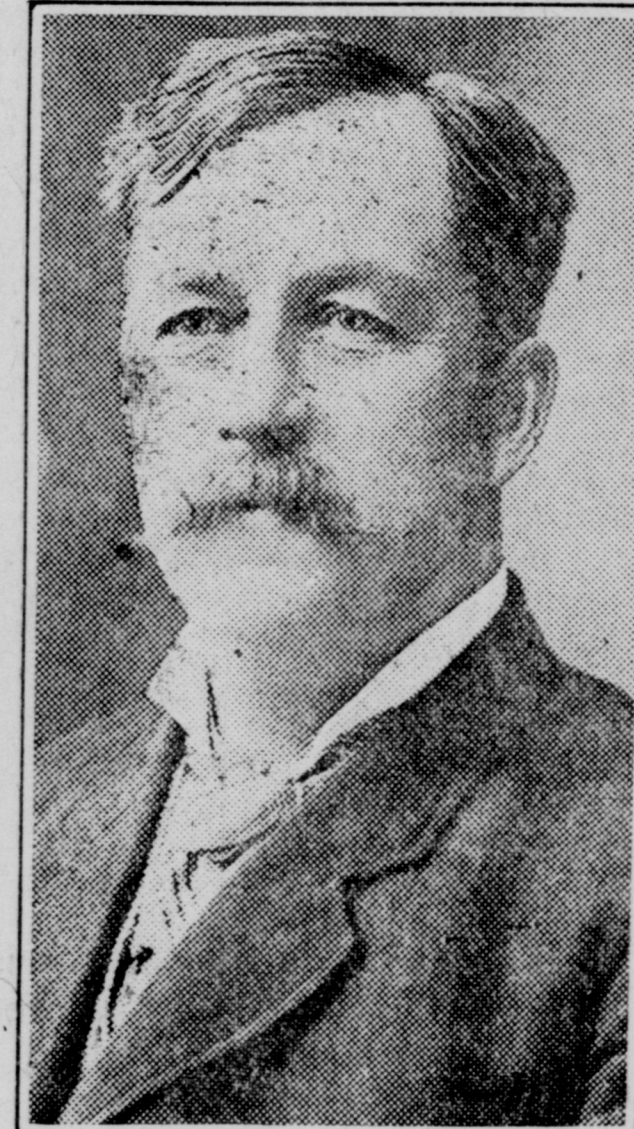

PROVINCIAL DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE DISTRIBUTE SEED

Shortage of Fertilizer

The seed purchased by the Provincial Department of Agriculture to meet the scarcity in certain parts of the province has all been distributed to the applicants or is on his way to them. The total quantity is as follows: 10,000 bushels of oats; 2,400 bushels of wheat; 814 bushels of barley; 400 barrels of potatoes. It has been sent to all parts of the province.

The problem of fertilizer is a serious one and appears to rest in the hands of the fertilizer companies. There is a

NOTICE

Application will be made at the next session of the Legislative Assembly for the passage of a bill to effect the following amendments to the Acts relating to the Town of Woodstock:—

1st. To legalize the action of the Town Clerk in giving the casting vote in the tie between two of the candidates for Councillor at the elections in January last.

2nd. To provide a method for the determining of the tie between two of those elected as Councillors at the election so as to decide which of the two were elected for two years and which for one year.

3rd. To amend Chapter 83 of the Acts of Assembly 1909 by striking out of the sixth line from the top of Section 2 of said Chapter the word "four" and inserting in lieu thereof the words "not exceeding five and one half."

4th. To authorize the Town Council to enact a by-law to provide for the payment by the property owners of a portion

of the cost of laying permanent sidewalks along their fronts at such places in said Town as the said Town Council may determine from time to time.
