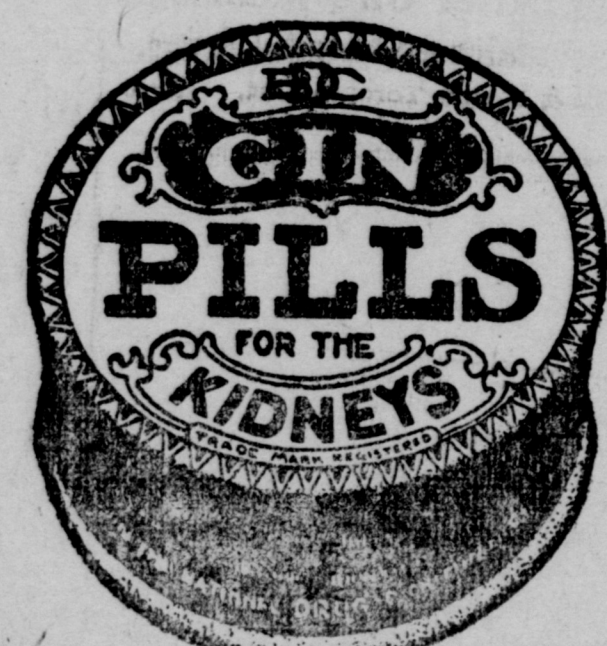

Will Take Less than Half an Hour to Erect Mills of the Forestry Battalion now Recruiting

The same rapidity which draws crowds of wondering young boys and girls to watch the erect on of a circus tent will characterize the erection of one of the mills of Canada's second Forestry Battalion, now recruiting. The mills are compact portable affairs, most of the parts of which are carried on wheels. When the scene of operations is reached in the Old Country and subsequently on the Continent there will be a job for everyone. With the same system which characterizes the work of the Engineers and E other units, the mill will be up and working in less than half an hour from its arrival. While some of the lumbermen are placing the various parts in position, engineers will be getting up steam in the boiler and all parts of the structural work will be completed at about the same time.

discovered. Block and tackle will bring the old trees down and the wood will be shipped to France and Belgium in barks and these will not be cut except on the orders of Officers of units which need the timber. Care will be taken to use as little as possible and none at all when other material will prove satisfactory.

But while the Forestry Battalion have the mills and the equipment for their men ready, they still need the men. They want everyone who has ever worked in a lumber mill in any capacity and they want them badly.

Included in the men they are after are blacksmiths, sawyers, edgers, stickmen, checkers and laborers. They are particularly after men of the trade. The members of the unit will be able to go forward with a minimum of drill, their work being for the most part some distance behind the lines and with a minimum of military disciplines.

## Local Firm Notified Big Shipment Under way

A. D. Holyoke, Woodstock, N. B. and J. E. Yorke, Centreville N. B. Distributors of Chalmers cars for Toronto and district, have received word from Harry S. Lee, general manager of the Chalmers Motor Co. of Canada, Limited, that the Chalmers service in Canada has not been interrupted by the fire in their Wakeville plant. Mr. Lee's telegram reads "Factory destroyed by fire last night. Automobiles not lost. Train-load shipment of cars being made this week. Full arrangements made to continue service without break. Keep on taking orders for immediate delivery."

The first reports of the fire appearing in Saturday's papers caused some concern among the prospective owners of Chalmers cars. "This fortunately was unwarranted, as Mr. Lee's telegram proves. The resources of the Chalmers institution are so great as to make unnecessary even temporary embarrassment for the organization of Chalmers dealers or to Chalmers owners throughout Canada."
