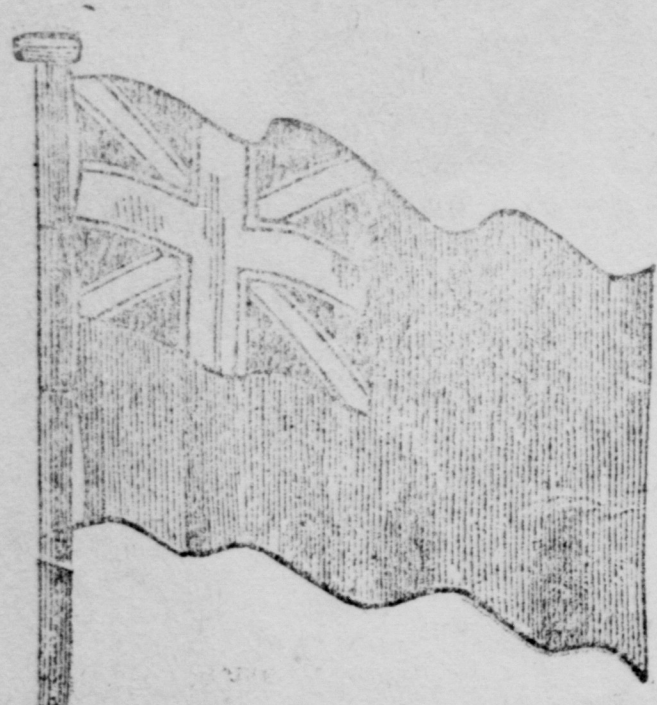

CANADA WINS.

Monday, Dec. 17th., 1917, will go down in history as the day when Germany received her worst defeat at the hands of loyal Canadians; not with shot and shell and the blood of heroic men, but with the ballots of true and loyal men and women. Canada's sons fighting for the peace and freedom of the world now know that those whom they left behind will not desert them, but that they are fighting for them wholeheartedly, and have declared by a sweeping majority to support and strengthen them until the objects for which the Allies are struggling have been fully obtained.

It is easy to imagine the joy and gladness among our boys when they heard the news that those at home are as determined as they themselves to show the atrocious Hun that Canadians never surrender, or Canadians never desert.

When the soldier vote is counted we will fully understand how our men in France realized the need of reinforcements and it will be easily pictured that the result of the election will be the best Xmas gift that Canada can send to her fighting sons.

From every standpoint the decisive victory will give thoughtful Canadians keen satisfaction, and no doubt can now exist that Canadians are determined to contribute every resource at her disposal.

Our congratulations to the Hon. F. B. Carvell, the Minister of Public Works for the Dominion of Canada.

Monday's elections demonstrated that the personal convictions of the Hon. F. B. Carvell were those of the loyal people of Canada. The sweeping majorities of the Unionist members are to no small extent due to his untiring efforts during the campaign—Canada is not going to quit and the Minister of Public Works fully realized it.

ter, and which to citizens of other countries might seem to be partial. Their record was before the world; and military leaders of both the Allied armies and of our enemy have been ready to praise the Colonial troops. Lord Beaverbrook says that a very distinguished French General stated the following concerning the troops of the great self-governing dominions who from so far have gone to sustain with their lives the fortunes of the Allies upon soil so remote. "Nothing in the history of the world has ever been known quite like it. My countrymen are fighting within fifty miles of Paris to push back and chastise the vile and leprous race which has violated the chastity of our beautiful France. But the Australians at the Dardanelles, and the Canadians at Ypres fought with supreme and absolute devotion for what to many of them must have seemed simple attractions, and that nation which will support for an abstraction the horror of this war of all wars, will ever hold the highest place in the records of human valor."

This is the tribute of a great French General to our men, and we trust that to-morrow as the citizens of Canada go to the polls that they will pay a corresponding tribute to the men in the trenches by supporting the men in Canada who purpose to sustain the army with means and men until final victory has been achieved.

MILITARY NOTES

Lieutenant Richard Maxwell's friends will be interested to know that he is in France. Lieutenant Maxwell was overseas with the 104th Battalion and has been engaged for some time in England as engineer to the Battalion, in regard to trench and road work which has been done by soldiers in the southern part of England.

The name of Lieut. Burdette W. Harmon, M. C., appears in the casualty list as wounded. Lieut. Harmon belongs to Woodstock, but is well-known in Fredericton as he is a graduate of the University of New Brunswick. He enlisted in the Canadian Engineers at the outbreak of the war and after long service was given a commission. Lieut. Harmon in addition to winning the Military Cross also won a Russian decoration.

Sunday afternoon, at Bor. Accord, a memorial service was held for the late William McConnell, who was killed Oct. 30th while on active service at the front. This young man will be remembered by many in Perth as he was at one time Proprietor of Hotel Perth and again here as an M. P. with the 146th Battalion. The sympathy of the community is extended to the sorrowing family in their loss. —Vic. Co. News.

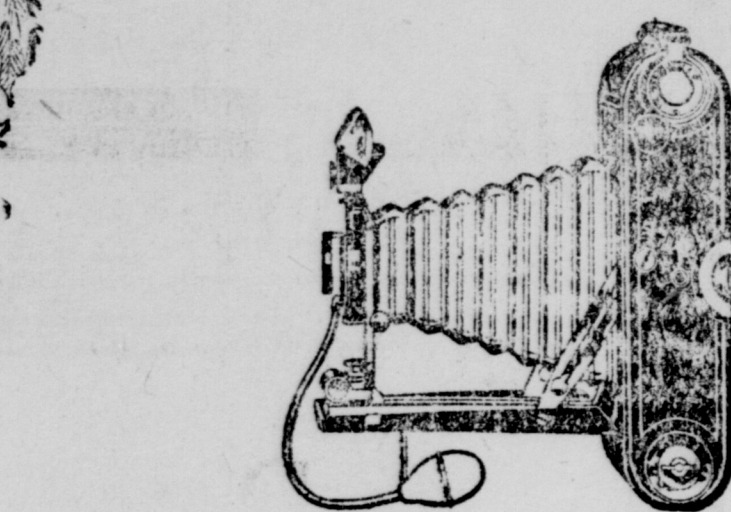
