MUST INCREASE WHEAT PRODUCTION

Every Farmer in N. B. Should Arrange to Grow Some Wheat Next Year.

St. John, Nov. 9.—Writing from Ottawa to E. A. Schofield, chairman of the Provincial Increased Production Committee, W. R. Reek, Secretary for Agriculture, says:

"Necessity for greater production of wheat very urgent; situation becoming more serious. Every farmer in province should arrange to produce some wheat next year, and seed can be procured if early arrangements are made. The days count, if the frost has not reached the province. The market for hay is not promising, and advise some hay land for wheat. The acreage must be increased many times. The feeling here is tense over the gravity of the situation.

The Provincial Committee has decided, in order to protect any possible shortage in seed grain or fertilizer for farmers for next season, that the Agricultural Department would purchase 15,000 bushels of seed oats, 3,000 bushels seed wheat, 1,000 bushels of seed buckwheat, 850 bushels of seed barley, 1,500 tons 3.6.5 fertilizer, and all of above will be available for spring or sooner, through the Agricultural Societies, and will be sold for cash.

LAWRENCE TREMAINE WILKINSON MADE SUPREME SACRIFICE

Rev. W. J. Wilkinson, rector of St. Peter's church, Springhill, has been officially notified that his son, Signaller Laurence Tremaine Wilkinson, Canadian Field Artillery, died of wounds on October 30th at the 44th Casualty Clearing Station, with gun shot wounds multiple. Three brothers and three sisters survive. He was about to be ordained in the Anglican priesthood when he heard the call of his country and enlisted in the 65th Field Battery at Woodstock. In August, 1916, he crossed to England, and in the following December was sent to France. He received his wounds October 29th, dying the following day.

Signaller Wilkinson made many friends while in Woodstock, and was very popular with the boys of the battery. He assisted in the Anglican services, and also at times read the service for the soldiers. Utterly without cant, cheery and good natured, his influence was always for the good of his comrades. Like hundreds of others he gave up much to enlist, and took his place with the rest of the boys, being above "dickering" for a place as an officer. His death is a distinct loss to the church of which he was soon to have been a minister. He is deeply mourned by all who knew him here. May he now be reaping the reward of the Just.

URGES SUPPORT FOR UNION

Bishop Richardson Says Opportunity to Create New and Higher Ideals—Solemn Duty at the Present Time—Distinguished Divine Makes Deep Impression

His Lordship Bishop Richardson Sunday morning administered the sacrament of confirmation to a large class at St. Luke's church. In the evening the bishop preached to one of the largest congregations that has assembled in the church for many years. His lordship, in an eloquent address, spoke strongly on the present war conditions and earnestly urged unity among all classes in this critical period of the world's history.

In the course of his remarks he said, referring to eastern profiteering and piracy in the olden times, "and coming down to modern times was there ever an age, one is almost tempted to ask, was there ever a nation in which the need of an awakened public conscience in this regard was more clamorous, when one looks back upon the record of the past decade and reviews the amazing and appalling number of commissions appointed to investigate the corrupt expenditure of money in the public services. I am not referring to our province alone, but the blot is upon the escutcheon of every province and the evil is as wide as the dominion is wide. If as one indirect outcome of the war there should come to us a political cleansing that we so sadly needed, it may well be that history will render judgment that we did not pay too great a price for such a cleansing."

URGES SUPPORT FOR UNION.

Referring to the union government the Bishop said: "Let us hope and pray that from the coming together of the best elements in each party to win this war, to which God has called us individually and as a nation, new and higher ideals of what public service means. It is worth praying for, it is worth working for, it is worth any price we can pay."

"I trust that apart from the urgency of our national need, occasioned by this awful war, every earnest man, whatever his political predilections in the past, whatever his preference now in the way of policy, will not fail to seize the opportunity, a God-given opportunity, to lift up the moral level of public life by giving his unprejudiced support to this union government. It seems to me, and I speak with a full appreciation of my responsibility, to be nothing less than a solemn duty at the present time."

The sermon was of intense interest delivered with all the eloquence and earnestness of the distinguished prelate, and made a deep impression upon his audience.
