## WORKED IN OIL WELLS

CANADIANS HELPED TO CREATE ROMANIA'S WEALTH.

Were Present When the German Invaders Swept Over the Country and Helped in the Destruction of the Oil Fields Which Hungarians Were Anxious to Capture and Operate.

**A** FEW weeks ago Rt. Hon. D. Lloyd George, Premier of Great Britain, announced that a British commission sent into Roumania for the purpose of destroying the wells and refineries of the oil fields of that country had reported the annihilation of property and oil to the value of one hundred and fifty millions of dollars. Every effort was made to leave the territory in such a chaos that the Teuton invader would find it impossible to repair the damage before he could be expelled beyond the mountains.

This report excited only mild general interest—for Canadians live in the heart of huge destruction. Their attention was more sharply aroused by a news item which stated that drillers from the county of Lambton, in the Province of Ontario, had assisted in the work of demolition.

The late Geo. Normandy, of Ennis-killen Township, Lambton County, entered Wallachia as the first Canadian drilling expert. From that time down to the present Roumania has seldom been without a representative from Ontario's own Petroleum or the country immediately surrounding it. Chief among these "knights of the pole and bit" may be mentioned Messrs. Lambert, McCutcheon, Brooks and Drader. The last mentioned is reported to have acquired large personal interests in the Roumanian field and was on the high road to wealth when the war overwhelmed him, as it has overwhelmed many British subjects in those parts of Europe which the modern Hun, like his ancient prototype, has so ruthlessly devastated. For some time Mr. Drader's fate has been uncertain, but it is supposed he is now a prisoner in a Teuton detention camp somewhere in Austria or Hungary.

But Canadian influence in the development of Roumania's greatest industry is not confined to the employment of expert operators. Before the pioneer driller, George Normandy, arrived in Roumania the Canadian system of drilling had been introduced from Galicia. The Roumanian wells are, for the most part, comparatively shallow, oil being found at depths varying from 300 feet to 1,200 feet. For such bores the Canadian system of drilling, which employs cables, the method of American origin) now universally employed where great depths are to be reached. The pole system originated (or at least was more generally employed) in the Canadian fields at Petrolia and Oil Springs, and is known the world over as the "Canadian system." This Canadian method

est and other places. From these radiate pipe lines in all directions to gather the coarsely flowing streams of the brown-colored "juice" into the great central cauldrons, whence it issues in a hundred forms, from the gasoline which drives motor cars, to the greases and oils which lubricate our locomotives and our railways. In 1914 the Roumanian Government began the construction of a trunk line from Ploesti across the intervening 170 miles of country to the Black Sea port of Constantia, where the oil would be loaded into tank steamers to find its way more easily into the markets of the world.

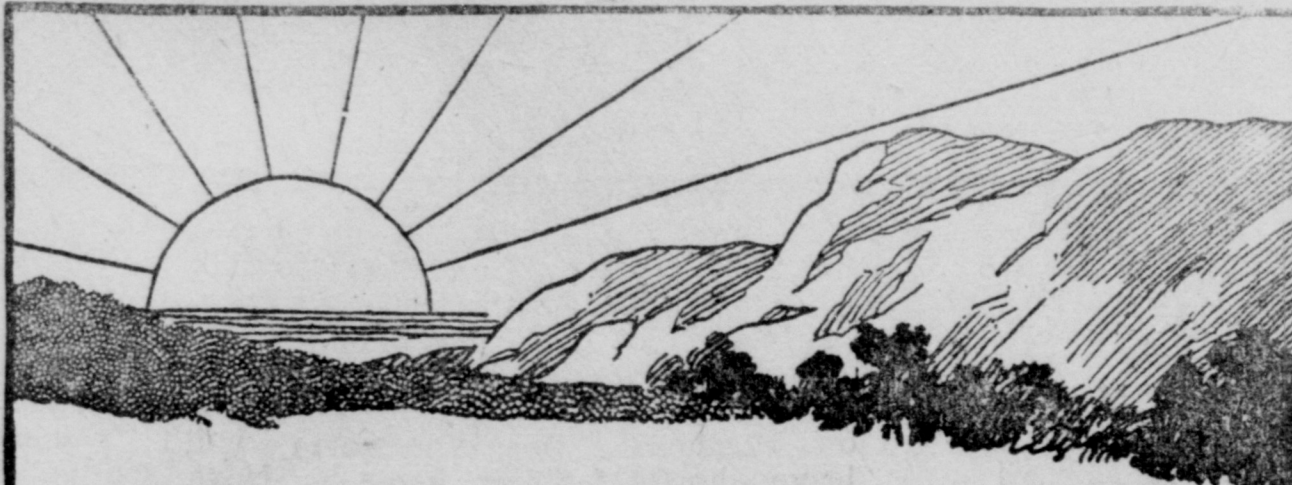
But the ruthless hand of war has rent to tatters the iron spiderweb from Bushtenari, Campina, Buzen, Monesti to Ploesti, and has broken the thread which was to attach it to the outside world. Ontario oil drillers helped well in the work of destruction. A thousand wells are now choked with steel and cement; a hundred refineries are now broken and silent. Drillers from Lambton County were present at the baptism of the infant industry thirty years ago. They watched and assisted its growth to maturity and independence, and they as Canadians and Britishers did their share as participants in the act of its destruction. ## Britain's War Bread.

Extensive experiments have preceded the settlement of the regulation for the future dilution of flour in England.

The new loaf must either contain at least five per cent. of the wheat "offals," or else there must be added to it at least five per cent., and it may be ten per cent. of another substance, milled from rice, barley, maize, or oats.

When the order comes into force on March 12 the browner loaves will be all wheat, while the whiter ones will contain from five to ten per cent. of other cereals.

After counsel with expert advisers, the Food Controller, to decide the practicability of the scheme, had exhaustive tests carried out by a well-known firm of millers; and he has personally examined and tasted all bread made from the different varieties of the new flour. It was put to the proof still further. One of the largest army commands in the country was provided for a series of days with the new bread, and a leading London catering house also supplied it to numerous customers. The general verdict was that the bread was excellent, and that its dietetic value was higher than that of pre-war days.

In the official view the order may be said to have accomplished the desired objective, namely, a wider area of selection for breadstuffs, with a consequent diminution in the consumption of wheat; and a corresponding release of shipping tonnage. Also a more nutritious loaf is produced.

The products of this land will supply with wheat the co-operative mills of Vancouver, Seattle, Newwale, Bristol, and London during the year.

An amusing sketch of the manner in which fraudulent vendors of the people's necessities were punished in the good old days is to be found in a Midland "History of London." During the reign of King Edward I drastic laws were framed against "Engrossers, Forestallers, and all sorts of Frauds and Impositions in the sale of provisions, especially against Bakers, who had got into a way of making bread under the standard weight, and against millers who dealt in bad measure."

## CANADA AND THE WAR.

A Letter That Has Been Much Discussed in England.

Under the heading "Canada and the War," a writer signing himself "Maple Leaf," has contributed a column to The London Evening Standard, which should help to clear up some present misconceptions in the Old Land as to Canada's position. Replying to "The Londoner," a writer who stated in the press that "some fifty per cent. of the people of Canada have given their all, but the remainder appear to take only a lukewarm interest in the war," "Maple Leaf" says in substance that Canada stands in a very different position from Australia, whose population is almost entirely of British extraction, sitting the large American and European population in the west, where thinking imperially is not a sudden conversion, like Bethmann-Hollweg's new submarine policy; also there are a million and a half French Canadians whose nerves have been rubbed to hypersensitivity by demagogues on the language question, and are practically excluded from recruiting possibilities. In the last eighteen months or so, from Canada's residue of British population and those of extraction totalling five millions, the contribution has been about one in twelve of the total population of men, women and children. He declares the climate, situation, and close influence of the United States have developed a system of life less in accord with that of the Motherland than that of the other Dominions, and says that thousands of ardent young Canadians have been prevented from enlisting by parents on account of the opportunity to obtain "liquor near camp" in England, and the presence of an undesirable woman about the camps. He concludes that Canadians became impatient at Asquith's dilatory tactics and the blunders as regard Antwerp, the Dardanelles, Mesopotamia, Roumania, and Greece, and finally expressed their disapproval by a falling off in recruiting, but he concludes that Canada will, after all, prove herself true.

Trade Still Growing. Canada continues to enjoy abounding prosperity. The remarkable increase of thirty million dollars in trade during the month of January is shown by monthly statistics. Both for this period and for the ten months of the fiscal year ended with January, big increases are registered.

The trade of the month amounted to \$177,946,907 as against \$147,447,295 in January of last year, while the ten months' aggregate was \$1,375,284,697, compared with \$1,159,933,598 in the corresponding period. Imports in January amounted to \$72,233,704, an increase of twenty-two millions. In the ten months they aggregated \$674,964,548, compared with \$394,093,988 a year ago.

The great expansion of export trade is maintained. In the ten months the total reached \$674,964,548, or an increase of \$280,000,000. In January alone, the export total was \$99,100,259, an increase of sixteen millions. The big item of increase in domestic exports was agricultural products, which in the ten months grew from \$217,909,912 to \$340,002,369, and manufactures, which increased from \$166,414,552 to \$268,655,496. Of coal and bullion which are computed in the grand total, the imports were \$2,928,278 in January and \$2,592,701 in the ten months, while the exports were \$1,423,489 in January and \$196,000,607 in the ten months.

In the same period mineral exports increased by seventeen millions to seventy millions, fish by two millions to a total of \$20,860,000, and forest products by four millions to \$49,833,800.

Griesbach, and the "trail" and journeyed all the way to Ottawa at his own expense. He joined at Valcartier the 101st Battalion, with which he fought in South Africa. Outside the battle of St. Julien, he has participated in every Canadian fight. He went over as a private and for a year was with the Strathcona's as head of the grenade section. He was given a commission later and transferred to the 73rd Battalion. He was reported missing on February 4 and is now reported killed.
