AN UNEXPLODED "SENSATION."

Unable to offer any explanation which reasonable men would accept, of the crushing defeat of Toryism in the Province of New Brunswick, the Government organs are resorting to their customary methods of misrepresentation and falsehood. First of all they turn to the race and religious cry which has so often served them in time past, and try to explain away the rout of Toryism by alleging that the French-Canadian vote went solidly for the Liberal Party. If this be true, it is vastly to the credit of the Acadian population of New Brunswick. Indeed it has been abundantly proved that they resisted every dishonorable canvass and remained incorruptible, loyal and true.

In particular, the Government organs are charging that the Opposition circulated an anti-conscription circular in the French districts. This "sensation" so eagerly seized upon by the Tory press, has been quickly exploded. The St. John Telegraph of Tuesday printed the following letter:

MR. MICHAUD REPUTES SLANDER.

To the Editor of the Telegraph: Sir—The Saint John Standard has published in its issue of the first instant an article signed by T. J. Carter, Esq., of Amherst, N.B., accusing me of having circulated in the French district of the County of Victoria the false statement that "if the Government won the election, conscription would follow in a few weeks and the boys in those districts would be forced to the front and butchered like cattle." Mr. Carter puts the question: Is this charge true? I have held meetings with F. B. Carvell, M.P., and Messrs. Tweeddale and Burgess in the County of Victoria and there was never a word mentioned by me nor by the other speakers about conscription. The statement made by Mr. Carter is too ridiculous to be published in any newspaper in Canada.

WHY SO MUCH SICKNESS

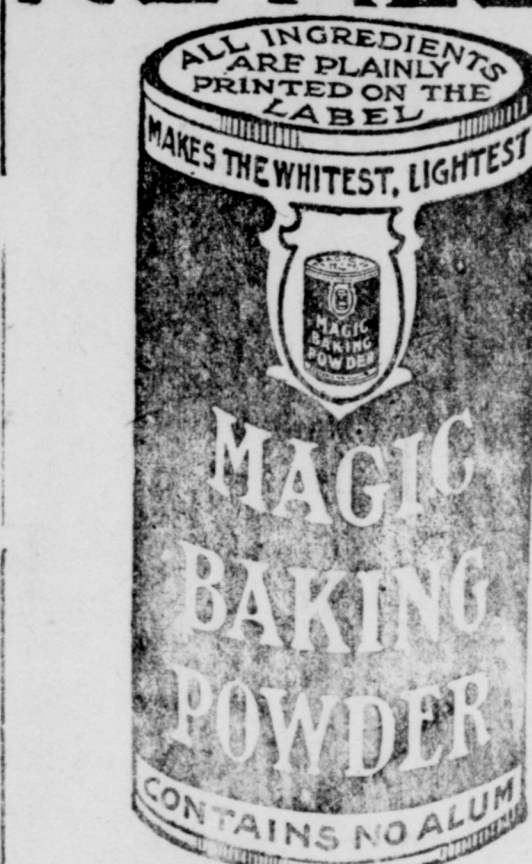
